### LIVE STOCK, CROP, ETC.

—Thomas McClintock & Son  
bought two broke mules at Owings-  
ville court, Monday.

—Earl Ferguson sold his crop of  
tobacco, Wednesday, to Dan Peed  
at 8 1-2 cents. He had 20,000  
pounds.

—S. T. Boler, of Woodford, sold  
his wheat crop, 1,300 bushels, at  
75 cents. It averaged 22 1/2 bushels  
per acre.

—Judge B. F. Day, of Mt.  
Sterling, sold to a Menefee com-  
pany, 2,500 acres of timber land in  
that county, for \$15,000.

—The yield of California lemons  
and oranges for the season of  
1903-4 is estimated at 35,000 car-  
loads, the biggest crop on record.

—Montgomery Chief, the most  
celebrated show stallion in the  
United States, belonging to Bell  
Bros., of Versailles, has been sold  
to C. T. Hewitt, of Quincy, Ill.,  
for \$20,000.

—Several carloads of Nebraska  
horses sold this week at Union  
Stock Yards, Lexington, all the  
way from \$50 to \$90. About 300  
stock ewes sold Wednesday at the  
yards from \$3.50 to \$4.

—McIntyre & McClintock ship-  
ped two double-deck loads of  
lambs from Austerlitz and Escon-  
dida, Tuesday and Wednesday.  
They cost 5 1-2 per pound. They  
have shipped this season 7,000,  
and have 6,000 more to go in  
July and August.

—In Woodford, Joe A. Cohen  
bought 270 lambs from H. B.  
Campbell, of Jessamine, averaging  
86 pounds, at 5 1/2c. Dr. Alex. J. A.  
Alexander, manager of Woodburn  
Farm, sold 517 lambs and ewes to  
John V. Jones, of Georgetown.

—Within a radius of three  
miles in Mason county, there has  
been 138 head of lambs killed by  
dogs since February last. At \$5  
per head this makes a money loss  
of \$690. When it is considered  
that all this destruction occurred  
within a radius of three miles,  
what must the loss have been in  
entire county.

### WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

—Below is U. S. Department of  
Agriculture's crop bulletin for  
week ending July 14:

Wheat is more than half threshed  
the former estimates of a light  
yield are verified. Corn has made  
a very rapid growth and shows  
considerable improvement. The  
tobacco is doing very well; some is  
being topped. Oats are being har-  
vested; the yield will be short,  
though winter oats are generally  
good. Hay cutting has progressed  
well. In the western portion of  
the State the crop is good, but it  
is generally light elsewhere. Clo-  
ver has yielded fairly well. Past-  
ures are in fair condition, but need  
more rain. Irish potatoes are very  
good. Gardens are in need of  
rain. Apples have been affected  
by the hot weather and are drop-  
ping badly in some localities.  
There is an immense crop of  
blackberries. Hemp is doing fairly  
well, but needs more rain.

### THE WORLD'S GRANARY.

—The inspiring yet almost in-  
conceivable figures given out by  
the Department of Agriculture in  
estimating the grain crops of the  
present year show that this coun-  
try is still the world's "bread-  
basket." The official report sug-  
gests the several crops as follows:

The falling off in the prospec-  
tive yield of winter wheat is almost  
made good by the increase in the  
spring wheat, while the corn crop,  
it is estimated, will be nearly three  
hundred million bushels less than  
last year. The weather since July  
1, however, has been very favorable  
to all grain crops and particularly  
to corn. America will still be  
ready to feed the world—at a price.
