Resolutions.

We print below the resolutions adopted Monday at the meeting held in this city. The movement to prevent adulteration of seeds is fast gaining strength and there is no doubt the united and earnest efforts of Kentuckians who are affected by the dishonest practices will result in securing beneficial legislation by the U. S. Congress.

RESOLUTIONS.

We, farmers of Bourbon County, Kentucky, having met in convention at Paris, Kentucky, on the 1st day of February, 1904, to consider ways and means of prohibiting the adulteration of Kentucky Blue Grass Seed and Kentucky Orchard Grass Seed, knowing how badly these industries have already been crippled by such dishonest practices, and wishing to arouse the Kentucky farmers to the true state of affairs, do resolve:

1st. That Kentucky Blue Grass Seed has given this State and this section an individuality of which we are justly proud, and has yearly added to the material wealth and prosperity of our people.

2nd. That to adulterate the Blue Grass Seed or Orchard Grass Seed with Canadian Grass Seed or European Rye Grass Seed is not only a fraud upon the purchaser and a practice to be condemned by all who uphold honest business methods, but is a direct blow at a great Kentucky industry, the very existence of which depends upon the purity of its products.

3rd. That unless the adulteration is restricted by national laws, our famous Blue Grass pastures are in danger of becoming infested with the dreaded Canadian Thistle, with which the Canadian Grass Seed is so closely allied, and, as many claim, the down of which acts as a vehicle for the distribution of the Grass Seed.

4th. That we earnestly endorse House Bill 9669 introduced by Honorable South Trimble, and now pending in the Lower House of Congress, and we call upon the Kentucky delegation to give its unqualified support to the measure.

5th. That we ask all farmers to interest themselves in this movement, and by writing to their representatives and in other ways exert their influence towards correcting an evil that is fraught with so much disaster to themselves and their State.

6th. That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to each member of Congress and each Senator from the State of Kentucky, and to the newspapers of Bourbon County.
