### Kentucky Trap Shooters.

The second annual meeting of the Kentucky Trap Shooters' League began at Mt. Sterling, Tuesday, with 60 of the best shots in the country present. Eleven classes were on for the day, and they were largely filled. The feature was the Hoffman Trophy at 25 targets. This was won by Walter Henderson, of Lexington, in a second trial, the first resulting in a tie. On the shoot-off he broke 23 out of a possible 25, and was awarded a handsome silver lovingcup, valued at \$100, over C. P. Sample, Virginia's champion trap shooter. C. O. Lecompte, of Eminence, won the prize for the best day's average, 194 birds, while J. D. Gay, of Pine Grove, was the victor in the amateur contest for highest average, breaking 187. The contest for the best team of three went to the Bourbon team, composed of Quincy Ward, A. C. Clay and T. H. Clay, the prize being three handsome gold medals.

Wednesday the 100-target shoot for the championship of Kentucky and a handsome silver loving cup, was won by Thos. H. Clay, of Bourbon county, who broke 95 targets, with J. D. Gay, of Pine Grove, second, and Woolfolk Henderson, of Lexington, with 98 targets, third. R. L. Trimble, of Covington, broke 98, but was ineligible on account of being a professional.

The Mt. Sterling Gun Club gave the following prizes for amateurs: Highest average for the day, a gold medal, won by C. A. Young, of Springfield, O., who broke 191 targets out of a possible 200; highest average for both days, shooting through the entire program, a silver cup; C. A. Young and T. H. Clay each broke 375 out of a possible 400, and in the shoot off Young broke 25 and Clay 23.

The following officers were elected: President, J. Quincy Ward, Paris; Vice President, W. P. Oldham, Mt. Sterling; Secretary and Treasurer, Mark Pragoff, of Louisville. The next place of meeting for the State championship live bird shoot will be Paducah, in October, 1904.
