Nicholas county was visited Sunday by a rain and hail storm. Heavy wind blew the roof off Ab-olom Brother's residence, near Carlisle, and he, being blind, in his effort to escape, was struck by falling timbers and so badly injured he may die. A portion of John G. Blair's handsome residence was blown down. Thirty barns are reported destroyed.

The brooders and incubators at the poultry yards of Frank Kennedy & Co. and E. H. Kennedy & Co. were wrecked and two thousand hens and chickens drowned. The hail broke the glass in J. W. and E. W. Shankland's hotbeds and destroyed growing vegetables and plants. One large window was blown out and one chimney off the courthouse, the roof on the Carlisle Milling Company was damaged, while many shade trees were broken off and blown down. A fine broodmare belonging to John H. Frey was killed by lightning near Carlisle.

Mt. Sterling Short Line.

The enterprising citizens of Mt. Sterling, on Saturday, filed articles of incorporation for the Mt. Sterling Short Line Railway Company, with capital stock of \$250,000. The road, a survey of which has already been made, will be built at once, and will be nine miles in length, connecting with the Lexington and Eastern at Indian Fields. It is believed the road will be the means of building an electric line from Mt. Sterling to Lexington and to Sharpsburg.

Now if our citizens would wake up and take some interest in the electric line to North Middletown, for considerable less money than it would take for this line, a road could be built to connect with this short line at Mt. Sterling and we would be in direct connection with the best coal fields in Kentucky.

City Tax Levy Raised.

At the meeting of the Paris City Council, on Thursday night, the following Tax Levy, on each \$100 worth of property, was made for the year 1904:

General Purposes	.75
Sinking Fund	.25
Library Fund	.15
School Fund	.30

Total Levy for 1904 \$1.45

This is a raise over last year of 15 cents, which will be seen is caused by the Library Fund. The committee who built the Library overstepped its authority a little and incurred an indebtedness of \$3,000 above the amount set apart for this purpose. This debt had to be paid and it was just as well to levy the tax now for that purpose. After this year this fund will only require a tax of about 5 cents to run it as per contract with Carnegie.

IN Bath county five men were fined \$25 each and costs for seining a creek in violation of the law. If the authorities will continue to enforce the law there will soon be good fishing in the streams of that county. What is done in Bath in this direction can be done in any county in the State. If the seiners and dynamiters were kept out of Stoner, in a few years it would be a splendid fishing ground. Every citizen of Bourbon county, who inclines to legitimate sport of this kind, ought to camp on the trail of every illegitimate fisherman and see that he is brought to justice.


