PNEUMONIA A MENACE.

It is Stated That the Disease is Very Communicable.

Dr. Buller Read An Instructive Paper Before the American Medical Association on the Use of Wood Alcohol.

Atlantic City, N. J., June 10.—Pneumonia, which, in the words of Dr. Edward F. Wells, of Chicago, "is a new menace to civilization," was the subject of much earnest discussion Thursday by the members of the American Medical Association. At the session of the section of hygiene and sanitary science the disease was dealt with in a paper read by Dr. Wells, who stated that it was virulently communicable and the section of materia medica, pharmacy and therapeutics held a symposium for the discussion of the subject.

Dr. Wells said that the prevalence of pneumonia is remarkably on the increase. He quoted 30 cases of communicable virulency. He recommended the use of moist bed clothes before the face and nose when sneezing and coughing. He stated that the pneumococcus was present in the throat and nose of many persons and that it may be communicated by coughing or sneezing.

Dr. Sternberg, former surgeon general, who is the discoverer of the pneumococcus, or pneumonia germs, doubted the practicability of any method of fumigating or sterilizing a room in which the germs might happen to be. He discovered the germ in himself in 1880 and went to Philadelphia to complete his experiment and verified them in Europe.

Dr. George M. Kober, of Washington, said that Washington was the only city not showing an increase in pneumonia. He said that as alcoholism invites the disease and that the Negroes, of whom there are many in Washington, are not heavy drinkers, and to that fact he attributed the proportionately small number of pneumonia cases.

Dr. Frank Buller, of Montreal, read an instructive paper on wood alcohol before the section of ophthalmology. He stated that wood alcohol is very generally used in such substances as Jamaica ginger, essence of peppermint, lemon essence and cologne spirits. The danger, he declared, is entirely unknown to the public and but slightly appreciated by physicians.

"Thousands of people," said Dr. Buller, "are doubtless taking this poison into their systems. The poison in its first stage causes mild intoxication and intestinal trouble. The second stage develops aggravated symptoms of blindness, the third overwhelming prostration and death."

Dr. Buller had reports of 50 cases of which 16 had resulted in total blindness, three in partial blindness and ten in death.

ATTORNEY GENERAL KNOX.

He Has Been Selected to Succeed the Late Senator Quay.

Philadelphia, June 10.—Philoander C. Knox, of Pittsburg, attorney general of the United States, was selected Thursday to fill the seat in the United States senate made vacant by the death of Matthew Stanley Quay. He will accept and serve by appointment of Gov. Pennypacker until March 4, the date of the expiration of the late senator's commission. Unless political complications should arise as a result of Thursday's action, he will be elected for the full term by the legislature, which meets in January. It is expected that Attorney General Knox will remain in the cabinet until December.

A LIFE PRISONER.

He Refuses to Accept the Conditional Pardon Offered Him.

Hartford, Ct., June 10.—Antonio Sperano, a life prisoner at the state penitentiary who on Monday last was granted a conditional release by the board of pardons, has declined to accept the release. When informed of the condition of his release, which was that he should return to Italy, he became very much excited and said: "I can not go back to Italy and work for 15 cents a day. I would rather stay in prison."

The Thibetans Repulsed.

Gyangtse, Tibet, June 10.—Eleven hundred Thibetans attacked the British post at Kangna, on the road to Lhasa, with great ferocity Wednesday. They were repulsed, the British loss being one sepoy killed and several wounded. The Thibetans bombarded Gyangtse daily.

Prohibition Candidate For Governor.

Hartford, Ct., June 10.—The state convention of the prohibition party made nominations for state officers, for congress and for presidential electors. Fred G. Platt, of New Britain, was nominated for governor.

Four Burned to Death.

Chattanooga, Tenn., June 10.—A special from Maggard, Ky., states that the home of Henry Suthern, at that place, has been destroyed by fire. Mr. Suthern, his wife, Jennie, his daughter, May, 18, and 7-year-old son were burned to death.

Aged White Man Hanged.

Paragould, Ark., June 10.—Mart V. Vowell, an aged white man, was hanged here 1 1/2 hours after a few minutes before 6 o'clock for the murder of F. W. Lovejoy. The hanging was scheduled to take place at 1:30 o'clock.
