INTERESTING PERSONAL NOTES

The first Japanese to receive the degree of doctor of medicine from Washington University, St. Louis, is Noakazu Fujimori, who graduated recently. He is also a graduate of the Tokio Saisei medical college and the New York state university.

Capt. Harry Houston, whose home is at Stanwood, Mich., is the only survivor of the 120 men forming the survey party on the isthmus of Panama in 1849, and one of the four who survived the hardships of the expedition and returned to the states alive.

Miss Caroline L. O. Ransome, of Washington, is the first woman from whom the United States government purchased a painting for the walls of the capitol. Miss Ransome, who has lived in the national capital for upward of a score of years, enjoys the distinction of having painted the portraits of more statesmen than any other woman artist.

Gen. Herman Haupt, now in his eighty-eighth year, is the oldest living graduate of West Point, having been appointed at the age of 13 by Andrew Jackson. He had entire charge of all the military railroads of the federal government in the civil war, and in 12 hours was promoted by Stanton from plain Mr. Haupt to Brig. Gen. Haupt, beating all records. He has 35 grandchildren, and his family connections number 61.

Alexander Sutherland, the man who led the charge of the famous "Light Brigade" at Balaklava, is living in the city of Denver, Col. He is 94 years of age, but has expressed a desire to attend the Louisiana Purchase exposition at St. Louis, in response to an invitation received from the school children of that city. As the bugler of the brigade, Mr. Sutherland led the charge at the command of the earl of Cardigan, and was one of the 150 heroes who returned from the field of carnage.

Tenth Season of the California Limited.

Ten years ago this fall the Santa Fe started its California Limited train on the initial run across the continent. Many improvements have been made in that busy decade. To-day's engines and coaches are much heavier than those of 1894. Millions of dollars have been spent on the track alone—some of it for oil-sprinkled (dustless) roadbed and oil-burning (smokeless) engines. The time is faster, too. Daily service of the California Limited will be resumed Sunday, November 13, for the tenth season, superseding the present semi-weekly schedule. This is now an all-the-year-round train, between Chicago, Los Angeles and San Francisco, running through Southwest land of enchantment. The time, Chicago to Los Angeles, is about 68 hours, which is fast speed for the 2,265 miles traversed, considering that several mountain ranges are crossed.
