**Circuit Court.**

This is the third and last week of the present term of the Circuit Court. There have been a large number of cases disposed of than for any term for years. Judge Carroll has kept the officers of the court, lawyers and litigants on the move.

On Tuesday, there were nine jury trials of criminals, and nine criminals, all colored, were sentenced to the pen. On Wednesday, Dillard Layson, alias Dillard Grant, was given five years in the penitentiary for house-breaking.

Upon motion of Commonwealth's Attorney Franklin, presenting affidavits of Ed. Thomason, a former grandjurymen, and Sherman Stivers, stating that they had been assaulted by Desha Lucas, Judge Carroll ordered a special grand jury to be empaneled to consider these charges in the affidavits. He also had a peace warrant issued for Mr. Lucas.

The following composed the special grand jury: John T. Hedges, Denis Hanley, Selby Lilleston, E. F. Cant-rill, J. L. Horton, W. B. Allen, W. H. Renick, W. P. Hume, W. H. Ingels, Lloyd Ashurst, Geo. W. Wyatt and Jos. Stewart.

Two indictments were brought in by this jury against Lucas for assault and battery. Mr. Lucas was arrested yesterday by Fayette's County Detective, James Wilkerson, in Lexington, and brought to Paris on the 1 o'clock interurban by him. They stopped in at Hill & Brannon's saloon after alighting from the car and while Mr. Wilkerson was talking to several friends he met, Lucas walked out the back door and made his escape. He had not been recaptured at the time we go to press, although the entire force of the Sheriff's office was on the lookout for him.

Mr. Lucas had been arrested at the time he struck Stivers by Chief of Police Hill and fined \$10 in the Police Court for that offense.

Mrs. M. Higgins, of Columbus, O., was here this week to attend the trial of her son, Harry Higgins, who has been in jail for several months upon the charge of burglary. His trial was continued until the next term of the Circuit Court on motion of the defendant. Young Higgins, it seems, has spent a number of years in insane asylums, as has his father and several uncles and aunts, and it was upon the affidavit of his mother to this effect that secured the continuance, so as to give her an opportunity to get officials from the asylums he had been confined in here to testify. His bond in the three cases was fixed at \$1,500, which he has not given up to this time.
