#### A Good Showing.

The Kentucky World's Fair Commission adjourned finally Saturday after auditing the accounts, showing a surplus of \$2,800 to be returned to the State Treasury, besides property valued at over \$7,000, turned over to the State.

#### Banks May Consolidate.

A report comes from Lexington that the First National Bank, the Third National and the Central Bank of that city, will consolidate and form one of the largest institutions in the State. The banks have a combined capital of \$600,000, a surplus of \$92,000 and combined assets of \$1,610,763.18, according to the last annual statement.

#### After Them Again.

The Law and Order League, of Lexington, is out in another card asking the enforcement of the city ordinances and the law in general in that community. It is given out by members of the League that the next Fayette grand jury will be asked to indict the Mayor, members of the Police Commission, the Chief of Police, the Chief of Detectives and the entire police force for failure to do their duty in enforcing the ordinance relative to the closing of the saloons on Sunday.

#### Remove Hargis From The Democratic State Central Committee.

How much longer is the Democratic party of Kentucky going to remain silent and let a man like Judge James Hargis stay on the State Central Committee. Every Democratic paper in the State that has the interest of the party at heart should demand that he be removed from the committee. He is shrewd in every move he makes. Did it occur to you that his leading attorney is the Chairman of the State Central Committee. He is in every way using the Democratic party for a shield. The farther matters go the worse they get. Our Governor's name is prominently mentioned in the late sensational depositions taken at Winchester, which implicates Judge Hargis, Senator Hargis and Sheriff Callahan in the Breathitt county assassinations. With their means and the support of the Democratic machine and the prestige given him by being a member of this committee Judge Hargis and his associates in crime may never be brought to justice. Shall the Democratic party allow itself to be placed in the position that this man Hargis is undoubtedly placing it, as a shield and backer.

The Democratic press should at once begin a war on this man and the Frankfort machine if Hargis is not removed from the councils of the party. It is only putting a weapon into the hands of the Republicans, and a dangerous one, for we believe if something is not done in this matter the Republican party will certainly gain control in this State. We have no majority to brag on. Why hide behind the bush till it is too late. Get out among the people and hear their talk along this line and you will soon realize the danger that is ahead of us.

The people demand Hargis' removal from this committee and it is wise to heed their demand. There never was a truer saying uttered than that by the Hon. A. F. Byrd at Lexington in his speech on "Lawlessness in Kentucky," when he said: "Kentucky needs to-day more Statesmen and less politicians." The time is now at hand when men can show what they are, Statesmen or cheap politicians. Act like the former and the Democratic flag will always float to the breeze in old Kentucky.

The Burley Loose Tobacco Warehouse Sales.

On account of the extremely cold weather of last week the offerings of tobacco at The Burley Loose Tobacco Warehouse at Lexington, Monday, were smaller than for some time past and amounted to only 98,500.

With the exception of a few crops the tobacco was of rather inferior quality. Notwithstanding this, however, the prices realized were exceptionally good and entirely satisfactory to sellers.

It is the general opinion of the buyers that values on the loose market were from one to two dollars per hundred higher than on the Louisville and Cincinnati markets. The demand for all grades of bright color types is very strong—the prices of bright trashes and lugs being probably the highest realized by the farmer for many years.

The anticipations of the buyers as well as sellers that the prices of tobacco would decline as soon as the promoters of The Burley Tobacco Growers Association failed in their attempt to carry through their undertaking, have not as yet materialized. This might be accounted for by the conflicting reports as to the consummation of the deal and the extremely cold weather preventing farmers from rushing in the tobacco.

With both buyers and sellers anticipating lower prices, in our opinion, such must exist in the near future.

Berea College Demurrer Overruled.

At Richmond, Judge Benton sustained the validity of the act of the last Legislature in prohibiting co-education of the races in Kentucky. The demurrer of Berea College to the indictment against it for violation of the law was overruled, and the case will now be tried on its merits.
