**Sudden Death of Prof. Young.**

We take the following from the Greenbrier Independent, published at Lewisburg, West Virginia. Prof. Young was the principal of a large female school in this city for a number of years and has many friends here and in the county who will regret to hear of his death:

"Prof. Charles E. Young died suddenly last Saturday afternoon at the store house of his friend, Andrew Bowling, in Staunton, Va., aged 69 years. He had been playing checkers with Mr. Bowling, when he complained of feeling badly and asked a friend to take his place. He then walked up and down the room several times, feeling nauseated, and thought he had a spell of indigestion. He went to the basement of the store and, not returning for some time, Henry Summerson went down to see about him and found him lying on his face, just at the foot of the steps. Dr. Atkinson, his brother-in-law, was at once called, but when he arrived a few minutes after, he found the Professor dead, and attributed the fatality to degeneration of the heart. Mrs. Young happened to be near in another store and was terribly shocked upon learning of her husband's death.

"Prof. Young leaves surviving him a wife, Mrs. Agnes (Atkinson) Young, two sons—Chas. E., of Staunton, and Roger A. Young, of Hinton; and four daughters—Mrs. John W. Arbuckle, of Lewisburg; Mrs. Bradford Noyes, of Charleston; Mrs. Chas. W. Bidgood, of Wilmington, N. C.; and Miss Georgia Young, of Staunton, who was here in Lewisburg with her sister, Mrs. Arbuckle, at the time of her father's death."

**Paynter Enters the Race.**

Judge Thomas H. Paynter, of the Court of Appeals, has announced himself as a candidate, for the United States Senate against Senator Joe C. S. Blackburn. The announcement has been expected for several months. It is conceded that he will have the united backing of the state administration. While he is not making this race as an administration candidate, his friends say, he will welcome all anti-Blackburn votes by whatever motive they may be impelled to support him.

He served three terms in Congress from the doubtful Ninth District, and he was elected by good majorities. He is serving his second term as Judge of the Court of Appeals, being nominated the last time without opposition.

**Yerkes Issues Order.**

Commissioner Yerkes has just issued an order that after May 1st all the offices of his Bureau will strictly enforce the law relating to the use of empty and branded cigar boxes by cigar and tobacco dealers, made to imitate genuine cigar boxes and intended for show windows and shelves. If found in use in any store they will be seized for forfeiture, and personal proceedings taken against the proprietor. It is further stated by the Commissioner that when the boxes or receptacles are marked or branded with caution notices there can be no doubt of the applicability of the statute to them, and manufacturers and dealers are warned against this in the future. It is not thought that Paris dealers are guilty of this practice, but if any are they should take warning from the above order.


