### About Oiling the Streets.

The question of oiling the streets in Paris is now being discussed by many of our property owners, and from investigation we find that our citizens are almost universally in favor of a fair trial of this method to lay the dust. In some parts of the city the dust at times is almost intolerable, and this question should be taken up at once by the Council. In cities where oil has been used, it has been pronounced a success. Some have argued that it would be a disadvantage by injuring floors and carpets by having the oil tracked into the houses, which outweighs the advantage of having the dust laid. In answer to this we quote from a recent editorial in the Lexington Herald on this subject:

"There is no question in our mind that if the oiling of the streets be properly done it is of the very greatest advantage, and there is practically no danger of the oil being tracked into or ruining the carpets and rugs in any of the houses. Even as the oiling was done here last year, which was largely an experiment, and when the company doing it had not had any experience in having it done in the best way, there were comparatively few complaints, and there was universal rejoicing in the benefits derived."

Paris is now making improvements on the streets that our citizens are glad to see and why not keep up with the procession and try this oiling experiment. Within five years every town in the Blue Grass of over two thousand inhabitants will be oiling their streets and why not Paris be one of the first to have this great relief from the abominable dust. If this experiment is made properly, we do not believe that any citizen will ever be willing to have the streets go back to their present dusty condition.

Not only is the pleasure of driving and walking increased, but a number of Lexington physicians last year bore testimony to the decrease in the catarrhal affections resulting in inflamed eyes and throats, which decrease is ascribed to the oiling of the pikes and streets in Fayette county.

### Trying to Import Breathitt Methods.

The developments so far in the Hargis trial at Lexington show very plainly that the defense is endeavoring to import into Fayette some of the Hargis-Callahan methods that have made the courts of Breathitt notorious. But we are thinking, that when the matchless prosecutors, Allen, Bronston and Byrd, get through with these gentlemen the effect for good will even reach within the borders of bloody Breathitt. The cheek and audacity of these Hargises is astounding and it remains to be seen whether their great political pull, heretofore accredited to them, will bring them out of this trial free men and conquering heroes. The circumstances of the discharge of one of the jurors and the intimation that the deputy sheriffs were in sympathy with the accused reflects on the good old county of Fayette, and it is hoped that these men cannot come to the very center of the Blue Grass country and run courts as they did in Breathitt. Their influence must indeed be powerful if such turns out to be the case.

### A Matter of Contrast.

In 1900, when the Republican press was confronted by the assassination of a Democrat through Republican agencies and called on to make choice between a campaign waged for the punishment of the assassins or a concerted effort in their defense, it chose the latter. The Democratic press, placed in like circumstances three years later, elected to follow the opposite plan, and, from the day of Marcum's death, the strongest demand for the punishment of his murderers has come from the Democratic newspapers.


