—The Emperor of Japan has notified the American minister of his intention to donate ten thousand yen (\$5,000) to the Japanese army branch of the Young Men's Christian Association in recognition of the service of the Y. M. C. A. to the soldiers in the field. The association has followed the armies with recreation and reading tents, three American secretaries assisting in the field work.

## Call For City Primary.

The Democratic City Committee met yesterday, at 2 p. m., pursuant to call of the chairman, and by a unanimous vote adopted the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That a primary election for the purpose of nominating Democratic candidates for the offices of Mayor, Police Judge, Chief of Police and Councilmen for the city of Paris be, and is hereby ordered to be held in said city on Wednesday, July 12, 1905.

The expenses of the election shall be apportioned in the following manner and prorated among the candidates for the various offices: Mayor, \$15.00; Police Judge, \$25.00; Chief of Police, \$25; Councilmen, \$25.00.

If the above amount shall be more than necessary for the payment of the expenses of the election any excess shall be returned to the candidates.

All candidates desiring to be voted for at this election shall give their names and pay the amount of their assessment to the Secretary on or before Tuesday, June 27, 1905.

Any candidate not having opposition at that time will be declared the nominee by the Committee.

The officers of the election shall be selected by the precinct committeemen from lists submitted to them by the candidates. Such lists shall be given to the committeemen on or before July 1st, who shall report their action for approval to the committee on Wednesday, July 5, 1905.

The Chairman and Secretary are hereby appointed a committee to make all arrangements for the holding of this election, which will be held under the Carroll Primary Election Law.
