Division of Woodburn Lands.

The deeds from the special commissioners, appointed by the court to make a division of the Woodburn lands, held jointly by the heirs of the late A. J. Alexander, in Woodford county, under his will, and to allot among the surviving brothers and sister the interest of Claude Alexander, one of the heirs, who died in April, 1904, has been filed in the Woodford County Court and finally approved.

Mr. Alexander's widow, Mrs. Lucy Fullerton Alexander, is deeded for life, with remainder in fee to her eldest son, Alexander John A. Alexander, 453 acres of the north-side of the old Frankfort and Lexington turnpike, extending back to the Midway and Spring Station turnpike and comprising the handsome Woodburn house. Alexander A. J. Alexander, in addition, receives from the interest of Claude Alexander deceased, 112 acres adjoining the above-mentioned tract and 93 acres of the old Frankfort and Lexington turnpike.

Mrs. Lucy Alexander Simms receives in all, 800 acres on the south side of the old Frankfort and Lexington turnpike, which tract includes the old Woodburn home. Kenneth D. Alexander receives 718 acres east of Mrs. Simms' land on the same side of the old Lexington and Frankfort turnpike, and Joseph Scott Alexander, 985 acres lying between the old Lexington and Frankfort turnpike, the Midway and Spring Station turnpike and the Louisville and Nashville railroad.
