## Circuit Court Proceedings.

On Tuesday, in Circuit Court, the Standard Oil Company was fined in two cases for selling oil without license, \$1,000 in one case and \$500 in the other.

Albert Ransdell, for uttering a forged check, changed his plea of guilty to not guilty, and was released by the Court on probation. Cashier J. J. McClintock and Mr. B. F. Buckley, the injured parties, petitioned the Court in behalf of the prisoner, and the plea was amended as stated.

Tollie Cox, aged 14 years, the young desperado of near Bethlehem, this county, was sent to the house of Reform for seven years.

Chas. Penn, who has been ill at St. Joseph Hospital, was adjudged a lunatic yesterday by a jury, and ordered taken to the asylum. The Court appointed, Mr. Joe Penn, his Committee, who qualified at once. Mr. Penn has been an invalid for years and his many friends will regret to hear of his general breaking down.

On demand of the Bourbon Fiscal Court that the Grand Jury be reconvened to make a more thorough investigation as to the manner which that court had been running the county affairs, Judge Stout had the jury summoned back and it is now at work. The Fiscal Court insisted on indictments or exoneration from the severe criticism made in the report of the Grand Jury to the Court.

The action of the jury is now awaited with much interest.

Charles Lee, colored, was given three years in the penitentiary for malicious shooting.

Court will probably finally adjourn Saturday as that is the last day of the present term and there is no special business to extend the term.
