Probable Fatal Accident.

D. S. Lermond, foreman of the L. & N. bridge carpenter forces, met with a probable fatal accident in the L. & N. Yards, in this city, yesterday afternoon. He had just stepped out of his office and started across the track, not seeing a car that had just been thrown on the switch by the yard crew, which knocked him under the wheels, cutting off his left leg and severely mashing the foot of the other. The right leg will in all probability have to be taken off. Mr. Lermond is a very delicate man and it is feared cannot stand the shock. A special sad feature of the case is that his wife is away from home, being at the bedside of a dying brother near Cincinnati. He was sent to St. Joseph Hospital immediately after the accident on a special train, being accompanied by Dr. Frank Fithian. He is one of our cleverest and most highly respected citizens and much sympathy is expressed for him.

F. W. Houston's Will.

The will of the late F. W. Houston was probated in the Bourbon County Clerk's office Tuesday. Mr. Houston Rion, a grandson, was named in the will as executor and appointed by the court. T. J. Judy, John T. Collins and W. D. Weaver were appointed appraisers.

The instrument states that James Jefferson Houston and Mrs. Boone have each received the sum of \$3,500, which is their full share of his estate. The residue of his estate he divides equally among his six children hereinafter named charging each with what he had advanced them.

Fannie L. Stone is charged with \$400; the residue of her share goes to her surviving children, Albert D. Stone and Mrs. Lizzie Weathers.

Richard Houston is charged with \$1,000, his share divided between his three children by his first wife, Mrs. Neva Dodd, Frank W. and Ralph Houston.

French Houston is charged with \$1,000.

Mrs. Joe Rion, of this city, is charged with \$1,874, though in codicil he gives her \$800 and states that her full share in the estate shall be \$2,700.

Mrs. Laura Craig and Joseph D. Houston have never been advanced anything and shall have their full share.
