#### Latest Enumeration of the Negroes.

The latest enumeration of the negroes in the United States, including its insular possessions, places their number at 9,204,531. Nine-tenths of them live in the South. Seventy-seven per cent. work on 746,000 farms, of which twenty-one per cent. partially owned by negroes. There are 21,000 negro carpenters, 20,000 laborers and nearly as many doctors, 16,000 ministers, 15,000 masons, 12,000 dressmakers, 10,000 engineers and firemen, 5,000 shoemakers, 4,000 musicians, 2,000 actors and showmen, and 1,000 lawyers. Since 1890 illiteracy has decreased from 57 to 33.5 per cent.

#### Hard Luck.

No. T. Clark, of near town, has had something like very hard luck in last few months by way of losing valuable horses by death. On Saturday, his gray buggy and family mare was kicked by another horse, breaking her leg so badly that she had to be killed. This makes the seventh valuable piece of horse flesh he has lost by death in past twelve months, one of them being a \$500 Wiggins colt.

#### Only Two in Existence.

The only two sixty dollar bills in existence have been found, one belongs to an Eastern collector and the other to Mrs. Julia Turton, of St. Louis. They are worth \$1,000 each.

"My mother was a Bryant," said Mrs. Turton, "and the bill was one of several paid to my grandfather, Col. John N. Bryant, who fought in the War of 1812, by the father of Mark Twain. The payment was made in connection with a land deal in Tennessee, the details of which I have never been able to learn. The bill was an inheritance of mine, but I never realized its value until I saw it mentioned in a dispatch. I value it as a family heirloom."

#### A Great Water System.

Work is about to begin on a water system at Los Angeles, Cal., which will secure an unlimited supply of pure water for all future needs.

The scheme is to bring mountain water from Owens Lake and River, in Inyo county, across deserts, through mountains and across plains a distance of 240 miles. Engineers have estimated that the cost of the work will exceed \$23,000,000.

The survey has shown that all the water can be conveyed there by gravity, no pumping plant being necessary. The construction of 30 miles of tunnel will be necessary.
