Combine of Investment Companies.

The Southern Mutual Investment
Company, of Lexington, has consoli-
dated with two other investment
companies, one in Chicago and one
in St. Louis, with a capital stock of
\$500,000, and A. Smith Bowman, the
general manager of the Southern
Mutual Investment Company has been
tendered the Presidency of the com-
bined company. The name of the
new company will be the American
Security company, or the American
Deposit Company. The other com-
bined companies are the North Ameri-
can Investment Company, of Chicago,
and the Colonial Investment Com-
pany, of St. Louis.

The general offices of the company
will be in Chicago, but a branch office
will still be maintained at Lexington.
The new company will be formed un-
der the laws of Kentucky, and will
have a State deposit of \$1,031,683.30.
A majority of the employees of the
Southern Mutual will be taken to
Chicago, and probably all will go.
