Americans in great numbers employed on the Panama Canal are throwing up their jobs and returning home. The cost of living on the Isthmus is so great the wages are not sufficient to pay for the food required. Milk sells at over 40 cents a quart; eggs, 10 to 15 cents each; fresh meat, 25 cents a pound, and chickens same price. An ordinary dollar straw hat cost \$2.50, and a \$3 pair of shoes is double that price. All other classes of goods are sold at similar advances in prices.
