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## NARROW ESCAPE

From Serious, If Not Fatal, Injuries In Runaway.

The handsome sorrel carriage team of Mr. George Alexander became frightened late Wednesday afternoon and ran away for about two squares before the faithful driver could stop them, he then having to pull them into a milk wagon. The occupants of the carriage were Miss Kate Alexander and her two little sisters, Misses Marion and Elizabeth Clay, all of whom had a narrow escape from serious if not fatal injuries. They were driving near the Grand Opera House when one of the horses slipped and in trying to catch himself broke the yoke strap to the pole. This brought the carriage right on their hind legs and frightened them. The driver, who proved himself to be an excellent one, had stopped them when the carriage ran upon them again, and they became uncontrollable and broke into a run down Main street, at the corner of Main and Seventh the driver, with rare presence of mind, pulled into a milk wagon which enabled him, with help of bystanders to stop them. One of the horses fell and injured himself so badly that he died during the night. This was one of the handsomest carriage teams in this community. Besides a few bruises of one of the little Misses they fortunately escaped without injury.

## Jett's Confession.

The full text of the confession by Curtis Jett of his participation in Breathitt assassinations was given out Tuesday night for publication and is an extraordinary utterance. It implicates James Hargis as chief conspirator in the murder of James Cockrell, James B. Marcum and Dr. B. D. Cox, and goes into detail, giving names of conspirators, dates and places of action.

Jett admitted that he fired the shots into Cockrell's body. He implicates Elbert Hargis, John Abner, John Smith, Jesse Spicer, Bill Britton and others, but says he did not participate in the murder of Cox. He declares Alex Hargis is an "innocent man" and that he knows nothing of any connection B. F. French had with any of the plots except in the capacity of attorney after the arrests.

It is an extraordinary statement and reads like a romance in crime. Jackson is all excitement.
