Death of Capt. Robt. L. Bowles.

Capt. Robert L. Bowles, of Palmyra, Mo., who was the victim of a runaway accident Friday, died from his injuries Saturday morning.

Capt. Bowles was a former citizen of this county, and prominent in his Missouri home as banker, farmer and capitalist. Mr. Bowles left Bourbon twenty-five years ago, settling at Palmyra, where he invested in real estate, amassing a large fortune. He is a brother of the late Socrates Bowles and an uncle of Mrs. J. H. Butler, of this city, and Mrs. Dr. Alexander, of Fayette county. Mr. Bowles was a Confederate soldier, belonging to the regiment commanded by the late Col. William C. P. Breckinridge. He has many friends and old comrades here who will regret to hear of his sudden death.

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Butler left immediately after hearing of the accident for his bedside, but he was dead upon their arrival. They at once telegraphed their daughters here, but the telegram has never reached them yet, and they did not know of his death until the return of Mr. and Mrs. Butler yesterday.

Funeral services were held at the residence in Palmyra, Sunday morning, and it was said to be one of the largest ever held in Missouri.

Beckham and Hager Scored.

Hon. N. B. Hays, Attorney General, spoke to about 352 voters of Montgomery county at the court house in Mt. Sterling Saturday afternoon in the interest of his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Governor. He was met at the depot by a large number of admirers and a brass band. He was escorted to the National Hotel, where he held a levee with friends until he was taken to the court house, where he began his address. He was given an enthusiastic reception, many ladies being in the audience. General Hays' address was somewhat different from any he has made and was a strong arraignment of Governor Beckham, Auditor Hager and Percy Haly.

He charged that Hager and Beckham had openly defied the laws of the State and had asked that court records be not published as it might injure the party. He stated that he was ready and willing to meet Hager at any time and anywhere and discuss the questions of the campaign. His address was well received and frequently applauded.

Hon. Claude Desha Dead.

Hon. Claude M. Desha was found dead at his home in Cynthiana, Thursday night about 11:30 o'clock.

He had complained of feeling ill during the day and had kept his room, answering the summons of his housekeeper, but declining to appear for dinner or supper.

At hour named the housekeeper was passing through the hall of his residence to ascertain whether he had retired, as she thought he had gone up town. She was horrified to find him dead, the body sitting in a chair with the feet resting on the lower steps of the stairway. The body as stiff, as he had been dead for perhaps two hours. Neighbors were hastily summoned. His death is probably due to apoplexy.

He had announced as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Congress from the ninth District. Previously he had been in the race for the nomination for Clerk of the Court of Appeals, but withdrew when the high fees of the primary were announced.

He had served four years as Court Clerk of Harrison, his term ending the first of last January. Previous to that he had represented the county in the lower house of the Legislature. He was a staunch friend and supporter of William Goebel and stumped the State for him. At the time Goebel was shot, Desha was chief clerk of the Senate.

His father was the late Gen. Lucius Desha, a wealthy planter and land owner. His grandfather was Governor Joseph Desha, one of Kentucky's early Chief Executives and representative in Congress. Judge Lucius Desha, of Newport, is a brother, and Mrs. J. W. Lucas, formerly of Paris, a sister and brother-in-law, of Hon. H. C. Duffy, of Harrison.

His wife died four years ago, leaving a daughter, who is about ten years old. The burial took place Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence in Cynthiana. Burial at Battle Grove Cemetery, at Cynthiana.

STOCK, CROP, &c.

—W. B. Woodford sold 36 head of fine export cattle at 5 1/2 cents per pound.

—A. J. Gorey has been offered \$12,500 for his colt Old Honesty, now at Saratoga.

—Abnee & Mussion bought of Jett & Hall 7,000 pounds of tobacco at 7 cents per pound.

—Joseph Stuar, of near Paris, delivered to Spears & Sons 740 bushels of wheat at 80 cents.

—W. A. Bacon sold to M. G. Cole, of Gallipolis, O., a four-year-old pacer, trial 2:15 1/4, for \$800.

—Joe Farris delivered to McClintock & Sons 18 head of 160-pound hogs this week, sold last February at 5 cents.

—Ed. and Harve Prewitt have sold to C. C. McDonald, buyer for Sulzberg & Swartzchild, 155 head of export cattle at 5 cents straight. The cattle will average about 1,475 pounds.

—It is stated by a reliable shipper that at least 45,000 lambs have been shipped to the eastern markets from this county for which farmers have realized an average of \$5 per head or in round numbers \$225,000.

—B. F. Buckley sold last week at Louisville 17 hogsheads of medium tobacco at from 7 to 13 1/4 cents per pound. Ashby Leer, of Millersburg, sold at the same time 20 hogsheads at an average of \$11.50 per cwt.

—Something astonishing is reported about the Delaware peach crop. The Pennsylvania railroad employes an expert to estimate the crop, so that it can provide cars. Now this trained statistician says the production this year will be 2,500,000 baskets, double that of any year for a decade, and four-fold that of last year. This immense output is attributed to the spraying trees which keep insect pests away.

—There has been considerable activity prevailing in the market for choice Blue Grass seed, the price having advanced to 90 cents per bushel, which is an advance of 10 cents per bushel in the past two weeks. R. B. Hutchcraft purchased of T. J. Judy and E. K. Thomas, of North Middletown, their crops at 90 cents per bushel, while Hon. C. M. Clay sold his crop to E. F. Spears & Sons at the same price.

Teachers of Bourbon District Schools.

County School Superintendent F. L. McChesney furnishes us with an official list of the several teachers assigned to the district schools of Bourbon for the coming scholastic year.
