**K. of P. Memorial Exercises.**

The Knights of Pythias memorial exercises Sunday in honor of deceased brothers will indeed be a memorial occasion in the history of Rathbone lodge, of this city. Brigadier General McCracken, of the Uniform Rank, has issued an order calling out all companies of the Second and Fourth regiments and the Knights who will participate in the parade will number 1,000. From Covington, Newport and Berry nearly 500 Knights will respond, while Lexington, Cynthiana and surrounding towns will send a large quota of Knights and friends. The parade will form in the rear of the courthouse, on High street, and, preceded by the North Middletown band, will march north of the court house to Main street and thence to the cemetery, where the exercises will take place, including the decoration of the graves of deceased Knights. After the exercises both regiments will march to the court house, where they will pass in review of Brigadier General McCracken and staff.

The Paris Military cadets, with a drum corps, will take part in the parade.


