One farmer who had prepared a field of fifty acres to plant to oats, and who had during the last week of March seeded about one acre when the rains came and put stop to further operations, says this little patch of oats is up nicely, while the remainder of the field remains unsown. He says he will now plant the entire field in corn and feed the seed oats he had purchased to work stock.

Four Riders Jailed.

Four alleged night riders are in jail at Cynthiana, having been captured after a hard drive over Harrison and Bracken county roads by Sheriff Gregg and a posse of sixteen soldiers and one Deputy Sheriff. The men who were caught, without any resistance, one and one-half miles the other side of Millford, in Bracken county, are charged with taking part with over fifty others in a raid on a Bracken county farmer, who was hauling his tobacco from Millford to Cynthiana to sell it. They are Will Brown, Bracken county; Montgomery McGee, Bracken county; Will, alias "Dogwood" Kenton, Robertson county; Chas. Fowler, Robertson county.

None of the men has made any effort to secure bond. While not officially stated, it is said that two of the men had on masks when captured. McGee is a mulatto.

Threaten Two Lone Women.

Night riders in Fayette county threatened to burn every barn on the farm owned by two lone women, only a short distance from Lexington, and as a consequence of the warning letter the owners have abandoned their plan to grow tobacco this year. They dug up their only plant bed.

Fifty-Two Night Riders Indicted.

The grand jury at Murray, which is investigating the night rider's raids, returned thirty-one indictments Saturday against men charged with participation in raids in Calloway county. This makes a total of fifty-two indictments which have been returned and more are to follow. Several of the men are indicted two or more times. More arrests were made by the Sheriff and the soldiers, and County Judge Wells said he expected to have twenty new warrants ready to be served on Monday. The people of the county are now backing Judge Wells and are ready for the threatened raid on the jail to release the prisoners.

Work Stock in Demand.

A Bourbon farmer who is well posted in everything pertaining to the farm tells us that nearly every farmer in the county will be compelled to buy from one to three additional teams in order to plow their fields and plant their crops. He said he has 240 acres of ground to plow and had calculated that six teams could do the work, but the consequent delay has caused him to increase his working force to nine teams, he having to pay exorbitant prices for work stock, which are now higher than at any time in two years.


