

Refers Governor to Records.

After the attorney for Powers had presented their reasons to Governor Willson why Powers should be pardoned, Arthur Goebel, brother of the martyred Governor, Wm. Goebel arose and said:

"I protest against the pardon of Jim Howard and Caleb Powers. I refer you to the records in their case, and in all the kindred cases. I ask you to make an analytic and comparative study of the evidence and every witness who has appeared at every trial, and that the capability and interest of every witness to tell the truth may be judged.

"The best criterion is not what I or they may say, but the evidence itself. The evidence shows that Powers is as guilty as can be. The world knows he is guilty. For eight long years I have assisted the Commonwealth in this battle. I have done nothing that was not in strict conformance with the law. I ask you to let the law take its course.

"There are those, many in number, and many have said it to me, we believe that even though Powers is guilty he has suffered enough and should be pardoned. That is mercy. If this is to be a question of mercy, I ask you to listen to the requiem of the winds which chant over the grave of William Goebel and to consider that his life and liberty was as dear to him as theirs is to them."

There was silence throughout the hall for it seemed a half minute. Mr. Goebel turned and walked out. Governor Willson then called upon Mr. Franklin to present his argument for the Commonwealth.

A petition was presented to both Houses of Congress yesterday asking the passage of the bill requiring publicity of campaign contributions to national and Congressional campaign committees. The petition states that the movement is not political, and the treasury party is held responsible for the failure to pass such a law. The plan is to have the States pass laws of a similar nature affecting State elections.

Call For Republican Mass Convention April 25, 1908.

Pursuant to the calls of the Republican State Central Committee, and the Committee of the Seventh Congressional District of Kentucky, and by virtue of the power vested in the Republican County Committee, of Bourbon county, Kentucky, a Republican mass convention is hereby called to be held in Paris, Kentucky, at 1 o'clock, p. m., standard time, on the 25th day of April, 1908, in the Hinton building, on the corner of Eighth and Main streets, in Paris, Kentucky, for the purpose of selecting delegates to attend the District Convention to be held in Frankfort, Kentucky, on the 5th day of May, 1908, at 1 o'clock, p. m. for the purpose of electing two District Delegates to the National Republican Convention to be held in Chicago, and two alternate delegates, a member of the State Central Committee, and an elector for said District, and for the further purpose of selecting delegates to represent said county at the State Convention to be held in Louisville, Kentucky, on the 6th day of May, 1908. Where Delegates and Alternate Delegates-at-large, and Electors for said State will be chosen to attend said National Convention.

It is further ordered that at the said time and place, to-wit: April 25th, at 1 o'clock, p. m., said mass convention will elect a new Republican County Committee, or Bourbon County, Kentucky, to serve for the ensuing four years.

Big Tobacco Crop Sold.

The last big crop of tobacco of the 107 acreage in Montgomery county, has just been sold by the Hamilton Farm Company, of Flat Creek, to Kirkpatrick & Clay, of Mt. Sterling. The crop weighed out about 166,000 pounds, and was of excellent quality. It has all been received and prized at Mt. Sterling. The price paid was an average of about 14 cents per pound, and brought a total of \$23,240.

The delivery of this crop virtually winds up all the independent tobacco in that section. It is given out that no tobacco will be grown on the Hamilton farm in 1908. What tobacco beds have been sown in that county are in fine shape, the plants coming up thick and strong, and are in advance of beds last year. While the acreage to be growing Montgomery county this year will be very small, about 250 acres, beds are showing enough plants to grow over that amount. Indications point to only about ten crops being grown in the county.

LIVE STOCK AND CROP NOTES

—Ed. Blake, of Centerville, bought of Walter Clark a pair of 5-year-old mare mules for \$390.

—In Montgomery, W. B. Greene has purchased sixty head of export cattle of Frank Boyd, and eighty head of Robert Howell. The cattle will go the last half of July, and will weigh about 1,500 pounds. Both bunches brought six cents per pound.

—U. S. G. Pepper and J. J. Peed, of Millersburg, have returned from Bracken county, where they bought three fancy driving horses at from \$185 to \$225. They sold last week a driving horse to J. F. Barbee for \$190, and one to Wm. Anderson for \$135.

—Clark Bascom, Jr., had a yearling filly to fall into a well and get killed near Millersburg, last week. Shelwas by Star McDonald, out of a Harrison Chiefmare. He had refused \$300 for her and valued her at \$500.

—At a combination sale of Hereford cattle held at Kansas City, Mo., March 26th, 27th and 28th, a total average of \$100.60 was secured on 128 head.

—In the year 1907 the United States produced 2,927,416,000 bushels of corn out of a world's total of 3,832,775,000 bushels. Austria follows the United States with 215,636,000 bushels; Argentina next with 14,120,000 bushels, and Roumania with 130,546,000 bushels.

—Cover a fresh egg with a thin coating of lard and it will keep perfectly good for an indefinite period, according to a report of a new method of preserving eggs, made to the State Department by Consul Murphy at Bordeaux. The discovery is of Italian origin and is regarded as important, as it is maintained that 100 eggs can thus be preserved with 4 cents' worth of lard and an hour of time.

—Scott Hudson, who will be remembered as one of the most successful trainers of trotters and pacers, and one of the greatest of race drivers, has very recently gathered together a "bunch" of thoroughbreds which he has shipped to England, to be used in cross country riding following the hounds. This is his initial shipment, and the results will be watched with interest on this side of the pond.
