## High-Class Entertainment.

With the same degree of excellency this week that has prevailed in their previous bills, Messrs. McMahan and Jackson opened the third week of the vaudeville theatre at the Paris Grand last night, with an entire change of vaudeville acts and new illustrated songs and moving pictures.

The present agreeable weather has had the effect of bringing out larger crowds, and as a consequence those who have been attending nightly are well pleased with the performances and high in their praise of the management, who is sparing no pains or expense to secure the best for the people of Paris.

The bill that opened the house last night, and which will continue throughout the week, is an exceptionally good one, and one that the theatre-goers of a town the size of Paris rarely have an opportunity of seeing, such attractions at this time of the year being confined to the larger cities.

Freeman's educated goats, the headline attraction, is one that pleased all and their wonderful performance of some of the most difficult feats executed in a manner that denoted almost human intelligence and masterful training, brought forth vociferous applause. As an enterainment for children and for older folk, we have yet to see its equal.

Master Lewis Nessing, the song illustrator, and Miss Jennie Le Bulger, a very clever monologue artist both scored a decided hit with the audience. Avery and Carl, two black-faced comedians, in their sketch, presented some of the latest and most refined jokes, and from the first kept the audience in a state of hilarity. This team, in its cleverness, adds much to the already replete bill, and is quite a drawing card.

The performance was concluded with the wonderful animated pictures entitled "The Child's Hate" and "A Trip to the Moon." Messrs. McMahan and Jackson enjoy the distinction of producing moving pictures that cannot be surpassed in subject and in the manner in which they are presented to the public, and of which too much cannot be said.

Her first husband committed suicide several years ago. Mr. Saffel was seen Saturday by several of his friends. He seemed to be rather despondent, they say, but no one had any idea of suicide. ## Governors' Conference.

The Governor's conference at the White House ended Friday after an enthusiastic session, which resulted in the adoption of a set of declarations, broad in scope, but effecting no permanent form of organization, or making any specific recommendations for legislation. President Roosevelt declared himself emphatically during the day as not caring whether action for the conservation of resources of the protection of the rights of the people be taken by the States or by the Federal Government, so long as action resulted. William J. Bryan delivered an address in keeping with the purposes of the conference, which was most cordially received. Governors of many States expressed their appreciation of the benefits of the conference. Resolutions were adopted by acclamation expressing regret at the illness of Grover Cleveland. The President cordially thanked the Governors for their presence and their earnest participation.

## Bryan in the Lead.

The Chicago Tribune which has been making a canvass of preferences for the Democratic nominee for President sums it up by saying: "William Jennings Bryan is the first choice of 72 per cent. of the Democratic workers invited to contribute their views. The overflowing majority of the party in favor of Bryan forecasts his nomination at Denver."

"Applying the two-third rule Bryan still has the nomination on the face of the Tribune's returns. His nearest competitor is Gov. John A. Johnson, of Minnesota, who obtained 11 per cent. of the total of approximately 4,600 votes. The difference between the two leaders is so extraordinary as to indicate that Bryan is practically the unanimous choice of his party."

"There is a good deal of opposition to Bryan in the Eastern States. It seems to be confined largely to the men who were behind Parker four years ago. These people have, to a certain extent, taken up Gov. Johnson, because, in some peculiar way, they have conceived the idea he is conservative. It is not so much that they like Johnson more, but Bryan less."

"But so overwhelming is Bryan's lead so far as the Tribune's ballot is concerned, that it foreshadows his nomination beyond possibility of opposition. He is much farther in advance of the field than Taft is on the Republican side of the fence."
