Paris to Have Baseball.

A few of Paris' baseball enthusiasts have secured necessary financial backing to organize a first-class baseball club for Sunday games. Mr. Stuart Strader, the well-known Lexington professional player was in the city Wednesday and was engaged to manage the team. Mr. Strader has gone to Cincinnati to sign several first-class men, who with those he has already signed will make a team hard to beat.

The Bourbon Fair Grounds has been secured, which insures beautiful and accessible grounds for the games. The first game will be played on Sunday next, at the new Fair Grounds between Paris and the Peerless Club, of Cincinnati. The game will be called at 3:15. Admission 25 cents; ladies free. Earl Swearinger, a Paris boy, will probably do the twirling for the home team, as he has few equals in the box. The Paris organization may secure the Versailles franchise and enter the Blue Grass League.

Since the above was written dissensions have arisen among the Board of Directors of the Bourbon County Agricultural Society. The baseball people have leased the grounds from the Committee on Grounds. Now several of the Directors say that no Sunday game can be played and have notified the baseball enthusiasts that if necessary an injunction will be gotten out against them if they attempt to play Sunday. So there you have it—wait for developments.


