Conductor Killed.

Gus Keller, a freight conductor on
the C. H. & D., living in Covington,
Ky., fell from his train at Jones sta-
tion shortly after 4 o'clock, Saturday
morning, and was killed. His body was
scattered along the track for several
hundred feet. F. L. Lytle, of 407 W.
Fourth street, Covington, took charge
of Keller's remains. Keller was mar-
ried and lived with Lytle, who is his
father-in-law. The run of Saturday
morning was the first Keller had taken
in six months, owing to having crushed
his foot. Two years ago he was seri-
ously injured in the C. H. & D., yards
at Dayton. Keller was a former L. &
N. freight conductor and well-known
in Paris.

of Midway.

Rev. W. W. Akers, of Maysville,
presided and propounded the constitu-
tional questions and delivered the
charge to the congregation. Rev. Dr.
J. O. Revis, of Nashville, Tenn., deliv-
ered the charge to the new pastor and
paid high tribute to the former pastor
the late Dr. E. H. Rutherford.

Rev. Dr. Shive has entered upon his
pastoral duties in this city with much
zeal and has already since the short
time he has been in this community,
made many friends and admirers. He
is one of the leading pulpits orators of
the Presbyterian church. His sermons
are strong and eloquent, and we with
the visiting ministers of Sunday, desire
to congratulate the congregation in be-
ing so fortunate in securing the ser-
vices of Dr. Shive to take the place
made vacant by the death of Rev. Dr.
E. H. Rutherford.

Dr. Reavis, who is Field Secretary


