**Old Hotel Burns.**

The Galt House, the oldest hostelry in Lawrenceburg, Ky., was gutted by flames Sunday morning at 3 o'clock, rendering the building unfit for further use. The fire originated, it is thought, from the kitchen, and was well under way when the alarm was given. Most of the furniture was saved and no one was hurt in the confusion.

**Miss Lloyd Gone Home.**

Miss Alice Lloyd has severed her connection with the Burley Tobacco Society for the time being, and has returned to her home in Mason county. Miss Lloyd since the society was first organized has been one of the most prominent workers in the organization. Miss Lloyd will probably return when the work attending the pooling of the 1909 crop is begun.

**Taxable Property in Woodford.**

The total taxable property in Woodford county, (exclusive of railroad franchises and whisky) is \$10,402,234. There are 119,586 acres of farm lands in the county assessed at \$6,239,210, or an average of \$52.17 per acre.

**Reward for Crime.**

Representative Ollie James, of Kentucky, criticized the passage of the Brownsville bill in the House. He said that President Roosevelt had backtracked on his original position and that the measure provided a "reward for crime."

**The Healthiest City.**

Chicago still remains the healthiest American city of more than 350,000 inhabitant, according to the annual report of the Chicago Health Department. Its death rate from all causes is 14.10 per 1,000.

**Rodes Chosen President.**

At a meeting of the Directors of the Phoenix National Bank at Lexington, Saturday, Walter J. Rodes was elected President succeeding the late D. F. Frazee. Fred Stiltz succeeded Mr. Rodes as Cashier, and O. D. Randolph becoms Assistant Cashier.

**Tennessee Legislature Deadlocked.**

The legislative wheels in Tennessee are still deadlocked, because of the absence of the thirteen Senators who have left the Capital to break a quorum and prevent the election of State election boards. Eight of the truants have been discovered in Hopkinsville, Ky.

**Mural Decorations Enriched.**

By sealing all of the bids on the contracts for the work to be done in completing the new Capitol the commission has saved a good many thousand dollars that will be devoted to the mural decorations. There was appropriated for the file cases \$70,000, and not more than one half of it was used. The bid for furniture was sealed down \$9,000, and money was saved on other contracts. Auditor James will sign the warrant for the payment of this money for mural decorations, and much of it will be used in that way.

**Remarkable Woman Dead.**

The oldest and most remarkable woman probably in the State is dead. She was Mrs. Nancy Ratcliffe and she had braved the storms of 105 winters. Practically all of her useful life had been spent in the vicinity of McKenney Station over the Boyle line in Lincoln county. She had been twice married and had her first husband lived until this time he would have been 130 years of age, and before immigrating from Virginia to Kentucky, he had the honor of visiting George Washington in his home at Mt. Vernon. Mrs. Ratcliffe continued to take daily walks and attributed her long life to plenty of outdoor exercise and fresh air.

**Back to Jail.**

Beach Hargis, who killed his father, Judge James Hargis, at Jackson, a year ago, was arrested at Jackson Saturday by Breathitt county officers and taken to jail at Irvine, Ky., where his trial is to be held in April, he having been tried there in December on charge of venue, a hung jury resulting.

The reason of his arrest was that his bondsmen, John and Floyd G. Day, his uncles, and his brother-in-law, Dr. W. P. Hogg, surrendered him. They were on his bond for \$20,000, and his recent outbreak, in which he created a reign of terror, caused their action. He accidentally shot himself three weeks ago, and only became able to travel Saturday.

The surrender of Hargis followed an outbreak when he went to a dance, and it is claimed, attempted to murder his cousin, Arch Crawford. Hargis was disarmed there. Later, it is alleged, he went to the Jackson Deposit Bank and demanded \$25 of the Cashier. He had no check, but claimed his mother would pay the bill. The Cashier paid the money. Later Hargis became intoxicated, it is said, and, collecting a party of his friends, went to the outskirts of town, where they created trouble. There Sheriff's went, and Hargis tried to draw a revolver. Officers covered him with their pistols and he gave up.
