The raisin growers of Fresno, Cal., had a profitable industry. As the demand for their product increased they raised prices. New growers came into the field. For a time there was great prosperity, but at length the demand fell off; there were too many raisins; prices declined sharply, and, with their warehouses filled with tons of raisins which nobody wanted, the situation became desperate.

At this interesting crisis a man of genius proposed that the people of California should come to the rescue of a languishing community. It was estimated that if every inhabitant of the State should eat raisins freely for a single day the surplus stock would be disposed of. Californians have much pride in their commonwealth and they are fond of home-grown raisins also—at fair prices. It follows that raisin day was a decided success and that a great hole was made in the visible supply of the fruit.

Merchants, manufacturers, distributors, sociologists and economists may draw such world-old lessons from this true story as they may, but they will have to admit that the consumer played the role usually assigned to him. By denying himself he punished the Fresno extortioners. By good naturedly over-feeding himself he mitigated their troubles. He was the key to the situation, the one indispensable person. Will he be forgotten hereafter?

Thirty-Eight Years of Peanuts.

The peanut crop of this country for 1908 was valued at \$12,000,000. Yet the "goober," as it is commonly mis-called, became of commercial importance only as far back as 1870. It would be well if peanut politicians could develop as rapidly and usefully.

The peanut was known to some extent in colonial days and probably came from tropical America. Until recently American peanuts were grown chiefly in Virginia, Tennessee, the Carolinas and Georgia. Now they come from all the South Atlantic States, the Southern border and California. In a pamphlet from the Department of Agriculture, Expert W. R. Beattie says that in the bollweevil districts they will make frequently a more profitable crop than cotton.

Mr. Beattie's monograph is impressively illustrated. In Figure 16 in the pamphlet you can observe shells snugly accommodating four well rounded kernels. And these are Tennessee Reds, which seem thereby to have advantages over the California double-jointed variety, of the circus vender. We read of peanuts plain roasted, of peanut butter and peanut brittle, of peanut oil, peanut meal, peanut by-products for feeding live stock, peanut hay—almost equal to the best clover—peanut forage to take the place of corn, peanut vines and kernels chopped into a balancing ration for dairy cows, and peanuts for fattening hogs.

Besides, peanuts are soil-builders and renovators. In the day of an advancing cost of living they are among the cheap things that made good.
