

Farmers May Win Victory.

After a day of skirmishes with Senator Aldrich and other members of the Finance Committee, Tuesday, Senator Bradley believes he has assurances that the House amendment removing the tax of 6 cents on leaf tobacco, with several modifications, will be adopted by the Senate.

Senator Bradley has refused to accept any compromise or change in his proposed amendment, which will prevent the tobacco growers from the full enjoyment and exercise of the privilege of selling tobacco in the natural leaf as provided in the amendment contained in the House bill or in subsequent amendments offered in the Senate.

It is thought that Senator Aldrich will no longer offer any further opposition. The Democratic Senators are to a man for the repeal of the tax, and there are enough Republican Senators of the same mind to practically assure its passage.

On Track of Leon Ling.

In the hope of capturing Leon Ling, the accused slayer of Elsie Siegel, the New York police have cabled to several cities on the Mediterranean coast and to points through the Suez Canal and Indian Ocean to hold up the German steamship Helene Rickmers and search it for fugitive. Information is almost conclusive, the police say, that Ling shipped from Philadelphia between June 10 and 12.


