

Bill to Adopt the Black Gowns.

It is understood that a bill is to be introduced in the next General Assembly of Kentucky requiring the Judges of the Kentucky Court of Appeals to wear black silk gowns while they are on the bench.

The members of the Supreme and Superior Courts of many states, copying the customs of the United States Supreme Court, have adopted this custom. Some have done so on their own motion, while others have been required by special acts to add to their dignity by the use of the black robes.

About the time that Thos. H. Paynter left the Appellate bench to go to the United States Senate, and was succeeded by John M. Lassing, there was talk that the Judges were to be made to wear the gowns. Judge Lassing did not like the idea, and claimed that he was too small of stature to set off a judicial robe properly. But they were never ordered and Judge Lassing, in a short, cutaway business suit, has been hating down opinions. His mind has been undisturbed by the robe rumors, but they are being revived now.

Judge Lassing will be on the anxious seat until the matter is determined. The Judge is not vain at all, but he doesn't like the idea of donning a silk gown every time he renders an opinion. But if that becomes the rule the Judge from the sixth district will beat all his associates in jumping into the silk gown, and he can be counted on to keep his on the longest.

Judges Thomas J. Nunn, Warner E. Settle and J. P. Hobson will become the judicial gowns. All have snowy white hair, and if they do not look like typical looking Judges of the law it will not be their fault, but rather the fault of the silk trimmings.

Judges John D. Carroll, Henry S. Barker and Ed C. O'Rear will appear as Episcopalian ministers. Judge Lassing will not discuss his appearance, but will probably add to his height by wearing high heeled shoes, like a former United States Senator James B. McCreary does on important occasions, although the Senator is of good size.

The Judges of Kentucky's highest Court made a splendid appearance on the bench.

The present Chief Justice of the Court is Warner E. Settle, of the second Appellate District. According to the Kentucky law during the last year of a Judge's term of service, which is eight, the retiring Judge sits as Chief Justice and presides over the Court. Several times two or more Judges have retired during the same year and then according to the statute they draw lots to determine which one should have the honor of serving as Chief Justice.

On January 1, 1911, the present terms of four Judges of the Court will expire. They are Judges Thomas J. Nunn, of the First District; Judge Warner E. Settle, of the Second District; Judge Henry S. Barker, of the Fourth District, and Judge John M. Lassing, of the Sixth District. All are now serving their first terms. Judge Lassing by appointment of J. C. W. Beckham. Unless Judge Lassing is re-elected to the bench he will not have the honor of serving as Chief Justice. Judge Settle will be succeeded by Judge Nunn, who it is understood, will serve a half year, and will be succeeded by Judge Barker. The order of succession is in accordance with the mandate of the law, which is written at some length to cover many contingencies and to give every Judge the chance to be Chief Justice.

Judge O'Rear has served as Chief Justice, and is now beginning his second term of eight years on the bench, having been re-elected last fall. Judge Settle succeeded Judge O'Rear as Chief Justice.

Both Judges Carroll and Holson have long terms ahead of them. Judge Holson was re-elected for a second term and Judge Carroll is serving by appointment of J. C. W. Beckham, to succeed the late Judge James E. Cantrell, of the Fifth District.

Of course Judge O'Rear will be on the bench or eight years longer unless the Republicans nominate and elect him Governor. Judge Holson it is believed, can stay where he is as long as he pleases. Judge Nunn has no opposition for re-nomination. Judge Barker is without opposition up to this time, but the Fourth Appellate District made up of Louisville and Jefferson County, is always an uncertain quantity in an election. George DuRelle, Republican, was elected to the bench from this district and was succeeded by Judge Barker, Democrat, who won by a small majority. Therefore, if Judge Barker had a re-nomination cinched, he could not afford to count his chickens before the vote was counted. Judge Lassing always lights on his feet, and it is said will turn up with a Democratic nomination in his grasp. There is not likely to be any opposition to Judge Carroll and a nomination in this district is equivalent to an election. Judge Carroll is another Judge who is apt to sit on the bench just as long as he wants to stay.

All the Judges except Judge O'Rear, are Democrats. William Rogers Clay, the Commissioner of the Court, is really a Judge of the Court, and performs the same functions as a Judge. The office was created by the Legislature to lighten the work of the seven Judges. The place is filled by appointment of the Governor. Mr. Clay was named by Governor Beckham.
