Four Different Brands.


A voter that cannot find a brand of

CAPTIVE BALLOON!

Only one ever exhibited south of the Ohio River. Holz' captive balloon will make regular trips every fifteen minutes during each day of the Bourbon Fair, from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. carrying passengers near one-fourth mile high, 1,200 feet, in perfect safety. The enormous bag is inflated with hydrogen gas several days in advance, and given supply enough to last two weeks. The balloon is held captive by a large cable attached to a drum on the operating engine, and when time to descend the engine is reversed and you slowly come to earth after the most delightful trip of your life.
