The Quarantine Order Rescinded.

At a meeting of the Board of Health Wednesday, Dr. Wm. Kenney, Health Officer, was instructed to rescind his order prohibiting public gatherings which he issued about ten days ago as a result of several cases of diphtheria which had made their appearance in this city.

The rescinding of the order becomes effective this morning, Nov. 26, at 9 o'clock, and on Monday the public and private schools of the city will resume their work. There will be regular services Sunday at all the churches at the usual hours excepting that there will be no Sunday School session at any of the churches.

No new cases of diphtheria have been reported this week and those who have been infected with the disease are well on the road to recovery and the officials apprehend no further danger from this source. The timely action of the officials no doubt prevented an epidemic of the disease in Paris especially among the school children, who most cases were the victims.

—Rev. Dr. B. M. Shive will be in his pulpit at Second Presbyterian church Sunday. There will be no Sunday School.


