Announces List of Deputies.
 Daniel W. Scott, who was elected Sheriff on the Fusion ticket at the last November election, Wednesday announced the list of deputies who will go into office with him on January 1. They are: Charles McKenna, C. H. Wilkerson and Frank Rogers, Democrats, and James A. Eastin, George A. Farrat and John Stephanski, Republicans, Rogers and Wilkerson were deputies under the present administration of Sheriff John McElroy, but were presumptively dismissed by Sheriff McElroy on election day upon the ground that they were using their official authority in the interest of the Fusion ticket.

Arguments in Burley Case.
 Arguments in the appeal from the decision of Judge James Benton, appointing a receiver for the Burley tobacco pools of 1906 and 1907, were heard Tuesday morning by the full bench of the Court of Appeals. E. S. Joutet, of Winchester, argued the case for the plaintiffs and T. L. Edenien, of Frankfort, argued for the Burley Tobacco Society. Miss Alice Lloyd, Clarence Lebus and others connected with the Burley Tobacco Society were in the courtroom to hear the arguments.
 Mr. Joutet declared that the sole question in the case is whether the 1906 and 1907 pools belongs to the growers, the poolers or the society. Judge Edenien declared that there is a continuity in the Burley Society, independent of the pool of any one year or any two years.

Oklahoma Bank Closes.

The State funds, amounting to \$122,867.93, are on deposit in the Farmers' National Bank of Tulsa, Okla., which closed its doors Tuesday night, according to the statement by Gov. Haskell. The Governor said Edward Cassidy, Secretary of the School and Land Commission, had deposited \$70,000 there bank and that State Treasurer James Memefee had deposited \$52,867.93. The State Treasurer's fund are protected by the school, district and municipal warrants and the school land funds by surety bonds.
 "There is enough money in the State guaranty fund," said Gov. Haskell, "to protect all depositors in State guaranteed banks unless too many of these national banks tie up funds belonging to the State banks."

War Against Steel Trust.

War was formally declared against the United States Steel Corporation by the leaders of organized labor throughout the United States and Canada at the close of a momentous two days' conference Wednesday. The decision to battle hard and long against the stand taken by the steel corporation in its policy of "open shop" was reached by the labor conferees only after hours of debate.
 Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, presided over the conference, and through him the measure was put upon the record books of the executive council of the federation.
 The grievances of organized labor against the steel corporation as set forth in the resolution have been forwarded to President Taft and the United States Senate and House of Representatives. The Governors of the States in which the United States Steel Corporation owns plants or has interests will also receive a copy of the resolution.

Announces Master Commissioner.

Judge Watts Parker, of Lexington, who was re-elected to the circuit bench on the Fusion ticket last November, announced Wednesday that he will appoint Richard Colbert master commissioner on January 1 to succeed George C. Webb, a prominent Democrat, who has held the office for the past six years. Mr. Colbert has been Deputy Circuit Clerk for twelve years under a Democratic Administration, but was an active worker at the last election for Judge Parker and the rest of the Fusion candidates. He will be succeeded as Deputy Clerk by Thomas O'Day, Jr.
