

THE LATE MR. SANFORD TALBOTT.

—Mr. Sanford Talbott died at his home on Higgins avenue, in this city Friday morning, at seven o'clock, after a short illness of pneumonia.

Mr. Talbott was born near North Middletown, this county, October 13, 1814, and would have been 96 years of age next October. His whole life was spent in Bourbon county, and he was an honored and highly esteemed citizen.

In the neighborhood where he was born, John W. Skillman lived to be 96 years of age; John H. Marks 91; Mr. Talbott 96, and John W. Thomas, who still survives, is 91. Messrs. Skillman, Marks and Talbott have died within the past six months.

Mr. Talbott is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Amanda Jones, and four children: Mrs. Geo. W. Redmon, of this county; Mrs. Wm. Dodson, of this city; B. H. Talbott, of Winchester, and Morgan Talbott, of Illinois.

Mr. Talbott was a devoted member of the Christian church, and a Democrat of the old school.

The funeral services were held at his late residence Saturday afternoon at two o'clock conducted by Elder Carey E. Morgan. Burial in Paris cemetery.

**John T. Burgess' Will.**

The will of the late John T. Burgess, of Hutchison Station neighborhood, was probated in County Clerk's Paton's office by Judge Denis Dundon Friday. The will was dated November 16, 1906, and attested by Jesse B. Wheat, W. H. Felix and E. Everett Wood. The instrument reads as follows:

"As soon as practical after my death I wish my property, both real and personal to be sold and division of same made as follows:

First—I wish all my debts and funeral expenses to be paid.

Then I wish South Elkhorn Baptist church where I now hold my membership, to have \$5,000, to be held as a fund, the annual proceeds from which to go to the general expenses of the church, and should this church become extinct the original fund shall go to the nearest located country Baptist church for same purpose.

Then I wish Bryan Station Baptist church to have \$2,000, to be held as fund, the annual proceeds therefrom to go to general expenses of church.

Then I wish that Mrs. Eliza B. Wilson, widow of Mr. Wm. M. Wilson, to have \$1,000.

Then I wish Newton McCarthy and John T. Burgess McCarthy, sons of Newton McCarthy and Sallie McCarthy, both deceased, to have \$2,000 each.

Then I wish Jessie D. Wheat to have \$2,000. Then I wish Allen P. Wheat to have \$2,000 paid to him when he becomes 21 years old, with accrued interest by Omer B. Lloyd, his uncle, whom I wish to be his guardian.

I wish Lucille Armstrong and her sister, Mary Burgess Armstrong, who now reside at Cleveland, O., to have \$500 each.

I wish Orville Wheat to have \$1,000.

I wish the Louisville Baptist Orphans Home to have \$3,000.

I wish that the trustees of the Williamsburg Institute, located at Williamsburg, Ky., to have \$10,000, the proceeds to be used in the education of poor and deserving mountain girls, who would not otherwise get an education. The fund to be known as the John T. Burgess fund.

I wish the Lexington Orphan Home to have \$1,000.

I wish Cora Wallace, my present cook, to have \$300, and Lou Smith, my former faithful cook, to have \$300.

I wish a monument costing \$1,000 to be erected on the family lot in Lexington cemetery to the memory of Henry W. Burgess and family.

I appoint Horace N. Davis and Omer B. Lloyd as my executors without bond, to sell my property, make deeds and carry out the provisions of this will, and to receive for their services \$500 each.

The remainder of my property unprovided for shall go to the trustees of the Williamsburg Institute to be used as the \$10,000 provided for in this will.

The following codicil was written on October 24, 1908:

Instead of giving South Elkhorn Baptist church \$5,000, as before mentioned in my will, I now wish the church to have \$3,000, to be used as already mentioned.

I wish that whatever Jessie B. Wheat may be owing me at my death to be deducted from the \$2,000 I leave him.

—One of the most delightful entertainments given here in many years was "A Singin' Skule of Ye Olden Tyme," at M. M. I. drill hall Friday evening. The cast was made up of local talent and was a large one. It has created considerable interest since the time it was organized and the large drill hall began filling early in the evening. By the time the curtain went up at 7:45 nearly all the seats were taken.

The participants and a large part of the audience were in colonial attire. Many of the costumes worn on the stage were old and handsome, dating farther back than the century mark. A plug beaver hat was the property originally of Mr. Robert Miller, a son of the founder of Millersburg, and is now the property of Mrs. Belle Taylor; one comb used is valued at a thousand dollars. All styles of costumes were exhibited embracing a period of at least 150 years.

The program was well carried out. In the beginning several numbers were rendered by sextette of young ladies; cornet solo, "Annie Laurie," Elder W. A. Gardner. The Singing Skule was in one act, lasting about one hour and a half. Cadet Miller took the part

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
