War-Time Relics Found.

While engaged in clearing a lot in Singer's Alley of the ruins of an old stable which had collapsed, Ed Hazlewood Wednesday found among the debris two implements of war that had evidently been concealed in the building for a great number of years. The two relics, one of which was a sword bayonet of the type used during the Mexican war and the other, a sabre being the same as those used during the Civil war, were made of highly tempered steel, and although rusted from the many years of exposure are fairly well preserved. Mr. Hazlewood will present his find to Mr. R. J. Neely of this city, who will place them with his already large collection of war relics.

Winchester Welcomes Plumed Army.

Winchester threw open her gates Wednesday to the Knights Templar, and thousands were in attendance at the sixty-third annual conclave. The address of welcome was made by former Mayor John Garner and the response was made by Breckinridge Castleman, of Louisville. The annual sermon was preached by the Rev. W. F. Vaughan, of Somerset. After the parade through the principal streets the conclave met in the fraternity building to consider the secret business of the order. Wednesday night receptions were held at private residences by half a dozen commanders and yesterday the business of the conclave finished and officers elected. The officers were publicly installed last night at the First Christian church.

By practically a unanimous vote Lexington was yesterday decided upon as the city for the conclave in 1911. Both Louisville and Covington were competitors for the meeting, but Lexington won out in the end.

The dates for the 1911 conclave are May 18, 19 and 20, and the Phoenix Hotel was selected as headquarters. John G. Cramer, of Lexington, was elected Right Eminent Grand Commander.
