## Moore Farm Brings High Price.

The sale of the farm of the late Mrs. Sallie E. Moore, which was advertised in the News, three and one-half miles from Paris on the Cynthia pike, was well attended and bidders were present from all adjoining counties. The farm, which contained 360 acres, was put up as a whole and bid to \$115 per acre. It was then divided into two tracts. The first of 235 acres, and improvements, was purchased by Mr. M. R. Jacoby, for \$175.25 per acre, while the second tract of 125 acres of unimproved land was purchased by Mr. D. W. Peed, of Paris, and Land Bros., of Lexington, at \$152.25 per acre. The sale in the aggregate amounted to \$53,639, or an average of a fraction over \$149 per acre. The price obtained for this farm was the highest in the history of the county for a farm of over three hundred acres. Auctioneer Geo. D. Speakes, of this city, conducted the sale.
