Stoner Stocked With Black Bass

Sixteen thousand black bass to stock Stoner creek, arrived in this city yesterday morning from the Government Fishery at Meredosia, Ill. The fish were transported from the Government Fishery in a special car, which was in charge of Mr. H. L. Canfield official distributor, and arrived on the 9:30 L. & N. train.

The credit for securing the fish with which to stock the supply in Stoner Creek is due in a great measure to former Chief of Police George M. Hill, who is now in Frankfort. Several days ago he received notice that the shipment would be made on the twenty-first and he had the consent made to the Chippewa Club.

When the fish arrived yesterday morning they were taken to the landing of the club where they were placed in a launch and distributed at different points in the stream. Mr. Canfield superintended the distribution of the fish and was accompanied by Mitchell Jackson and Chief of Police J. C. Elgin.
