

STOCK, CROP AND FARM NOTES.

CARLISLE COURT—The Carlisle
Advocate reports the Nicholas county
court as follows: "Carlisle was alive
with people Monday. It being Court
day, and tobacco speaking was respon-
sible for the large crowd. It is aston-
ishing in the past two or three court
days the amount of stock that is
brought in for the market. Our streets
now remind you of the days of old.
I know how could it be different
when everything that is offered for
sale brings money and whole heaps
of it. Following are few of the
sales:

"H. S. Caywood, of Bourbon,
bought a nice driving mare of Tom
Dillon for \$175.

"W. G. McClintock bought of J. B.
Sanford 15 shoats a 9¢ cent. He also
bought a work mule of Elis Garrison
at \$126, and 9 feeding cattle at 5 to
5¢ cents.

"John H. Marr bought of Mrs.
Henry Wel's two yearling steers at a
fine price.

"Reynolds Letton bought of Ben
Henry 10 yearling steers under the
hammer at \$25.30 per head.
"H. N. Rankin bought 50 mule colts
on the streets at prices ranging from
\$40 to \$115. He also bought 15 head
of horse colts at from \$40 to \$65.
There were more mule colts on the
market than has been this year."

—Farmers, says the Nicholas Advo-
cate are paying \$10 per hundred for
stock hogs, and claim they are very
scarce. This means that bacon and
ham will be out of sight in price again
this year.

—John H. Marr of Milersburg, sold
last week to Joe and J. J. McConnaugh,
of Carlisle, a pair of mules for
\$450.

The Mooted Question.

The Supreme Courts of the United

district court upheld the School Board
