### A Serious Matter.

The very large growth of the cities of the country, as shown by the census, is a cause for disquietude as well as congratulation. If this congestion in cities continues without a corresponding increase in agricultural products the United States will soon cease to be an exporting country, and will have to be competing with other importing countries for food. If such should soon come to be the case, the sooner we take off all tariff duties on food products the better, so that matters may adjust themselves before the actual pinch comes for enough food to feed all our people.

The high protective tariff imposed on farm products entirely useless as long as we have a surplus that must be sold abroad, but directly we begin to import ever so little, the tariff on cattle, cereals and other food products would add to the normal prices of such articles; which would mean from 50 to 75 per cent increase in the present high price of food.

What do the voters care for the animosities of Tatt and Teddy and their followers? The main thing is the question of the policies that will be pursued and whether the cost of living will be reduced to match the ordinary income.

The rubber schedule was increased 17 1/2 per cent to make less trouble in assessing the duty, according to Senator Aldrich. How much trouble that increase will cause the Republican party and the tariff tax payers was not taken into consideration.

A writer in the "Nineteenth Century," after a careful study of German economies, sets forth at length the "Revolt against Protection in Germany." He declares that not only is the tariff the mother of Trusts—no less than 385 of them—but is also responsible for the rise in the cost of living. This article might have been originally written about our own situation and adapted merely by the changing of names and places.

### How Government Crop Reports are Made.

While traveling through Georgia I came across one of the township correspondents, appointed by the Agricultural Department of Washington, who send in monthly reports regarding the crop conditions in their counties. The details of the comprehensive system employed by the department in gathering crop information from all over the country are interesting. There are thirty thousand township correspondents scattered all over the union, whose duty is to go carefully over the territory and submit each month concrete information as to the condition of all kinds of crops. In addition to this branch three thousand "county correspondents" send in separate reports from those of the township men. A state agent makes a further report direct from his agents, and an organization in direct communication with the department comprising seventeen traveling "field agents," go about the country and make separate reports for groups of states. Special cotton correspondents are also employed to furnish accurate information concerning the cotton yield. Five different reports are sent to Washington each month by five different sets of correspondents. This safeguards the government crop reports for accuracy in local crop reports, and keeps the great crop account and cost estimates for the million of American farmers. These records are sent to the Agricultural Department. Mr. Olmstead of the Bureau of Statistics, and Mr. Mur, his assistant and a board go over all the five reports from five distinct groups of correspondents, and from all the figures a crop report estimate is distributed to seventy thousand post offices throughout the country every month.—From "The Harvest of 1910," in the National Magazine for October.
