Two May Die from Shot Wounds.
 A pathetic story of friendly devotion with a sad sequel is told in a press dispatch from Halleck, Minn. Walter Smith of Sioux City, Ia., was out hunting. While lighting his pipe a gun in the hands of Smith was accidentally discharged and load of shot tearing away the entire portion of Simmons' face, including his tongue.
 Crazy by grief at the sight of his companion's plight, Smith ordered Simmons to do the same to him or kill him if he preferred, and handed the injured man the gun. Simmons took the weapon that had inflicted the horrible injury and pulled the trigger and both were disgraced for life in almost the same identical way.
 Bleeding from their wounds they crawled on their hands and knees to a farm house leaving a trail of blood in their path. Upon reaching the house they both became unconscious. Both men are at the point of death in a hospital at Halleck, Minn., and little hope is entertained for the recovery of either. Should such be the case neither of them will ever be able to talk.

Frankfort May Not Play Ball.
 A dispatch from Frankfort says: "The fact that no representative of the Frankfort base ball club was present at the meeting of the Blue Grass League in Paris this week, does not mean that Frankfort will have no team next year, but there is a chance that such a thing might happen."
 "No club here has ever made any money. The past season was especially disastrous one account of the many rainy Sundays and the four men who financed the club lost several hundred dollars. The best that can be hoped for with the present salaries and expenses is for the club here to come out even on a season provided rains do not interfere with many Sunday games. With this condition staring the fans in the face it is a hard matter to get anyone to undertake to pilot a team and pocket the losses."
 "Frankfort has been in the Blue Grass League since it was first organized, but with a different management each succeeding year and it would be a big disappointment to the fans if Frankfort was not in the league next year."
 "The officers of the present Frankfort club will call a meeting sometime in the next few weeks and discuss the situation from all standpoints and some plan may be evolved by which a club may be financed here next season."

First Printed Book.
 The first book printed with type, according to Pettigrew, with the Latin Bible, published by John Guttenberg, at Layence, about 1455; but Haydn is inclined to assign a somewhat later date to this, by making the Book of Psalms, by Faust and Scheffer, printed on August 14, 1457, the first book.

Local Option Petitions are Filed.
 Two petitions asking for local option election were filed in Cynthia Wednesday in the county court. Early in the day the drys filed a petition bearing 1,522 names asking for a local option election in Harrison county on July 18, 1911. Late in the afternoon the wets filed their petition getting in their petition the same day as the drys. The petition filed by the wets bears 1,405 signatures and they have a separate petition asking that Cynthia be made a separate unit. They ask for an election on February 3, 1911.

Aviator Loses Gamble With Death.
 Fighting with grim death at the dizzy height of 500 feet, Aviator Ralph White, the intrepid birdman, who held the world's record for altitude with a flight of 9,714 feet, fell with his broken aeroplane at Denver, Col., Thursday afternoon and his life crushed out.
 The accident was witnessed by 15,000 people who had gathered to witness the aerial contests. Seemingly with the realization that it was impossible for him to right his broken machine, he attempted to climb to the top of the aeroplane and if possible keep the heavy structure from crushing out his life. The swift descent was begun and the daring aviator was not quick enough.
 Johnson attempted to thrill the crowd with the most daring feat ever attempted by a birdman—the spiral glide. The effort cost him his life. He had gone through a sensational series of dips and glides and the ascent began. In making a circle his machine tilted. A second later the wings of the machine folded as if on hinges. He attempted to right the plane but it swept toward earth at a rapid pace. He worked hard to warp the planes that they might catch the air and check his descent and for a moment it seemed as if he would be successful, when within three hundred feet of the earth the machine turned completely over with the aviator fighting grimly to the last crashed to the earth.
 His body was crushed to a pulp. Every bone was broken and a shattered wooden stay had gone almost through Johnson's body.

Neck Broken by Fall.

 Bridges had been employed on the bridge for some months and was assisting in moving a heavy piece of lumber when the accident occurred. Missing his footing, he fell from the bridge, struck a tower of masonry some distance below, which snapped his neck, and was dashed into the river 250 feet below.
 Bridges is survived by his wife and four children, who live near High Bridge. This is the first accident to occur during the construction.

Newman Announces Candidacy.
 Former State Senator J. W. Newman Friday night made formal announcement of his candidacy for Commissioner of Agriculture on the Democratic ticket to be nominated next year.

 The only other announced candidate for the office is Judge Ben F. Hill of Henry county, who has written to a number of his friends in various centers of the state that he would be in the race.
