**The Way of the World.**

How soon after the hand of death is laid upon the mortal does the remembrance of his greatness cease. How soon is memory's slate wiped of the records of their greatest deeds when in poverty he is stricken by the ruthless hand of the Reaper.

It has been so since the beginning of time. Some of the most distinguished have died in want, and friends who had known them in life and drank of their sweets bowed not their heads in sorrow or paid respect to their memory even in the sad hour of death.

This is applied to the case of John G. Carlisle, one of Kentucky's greatest sons, who died recently in New York. Serving his State and Nation in various capacities, he built for himself a name that should live forever, but dying practically penniless he has been forgotten. In the city of his nativity, where in life and wealth he would have been greeted by thousands, yet all that remained mortal of the great Carlisle found no friends to care at the last.

The Times-Star of Cincinnati, recently contained the following:

"Greatness, thy name is vanity. Not only were the remains of John Griffin Carlisle hauled from the depot to the undertaker's establishment in an express wagon, at the home of his magnificent maturity, with no citizens committee to do reverence to a memory fragrant with genius, but neither was there any to provide a burial permit, no friend to pay the funeral expenses. By contributions only, apparently, many of them from those who knew him not in life, but in death revered him more than many who had called him friend, was it made possible to save from burial by the city the form of the man who has for two generations reflected upon Covington and upon Kentucky, aye, upon the United States, the light of a magnificent mentality, the glow of a grand character.

"The news from Covington is that Saturday there was taken a collection among the people of that town to provide for the expenses of John Griffin Carlisle's last rites. And who was John Griffin Carlisle? For years it is not worth while to enumerate, many years Representative in Congress, Speaker of the House, then United States Senator and afterwards Secretary of the Treasury. This after, he had held position after position of honor in the service of his county and State at home.

"One of the greatest statesmen in point of mental equipment in the country's history. A lawyer without a superior who had earned millions and received thousands, but to put them quickly into circulation again. A genius, a gentleman, great of head and great of heart, he died apparently impoverished to his last dollar and seemingly without a friend having at once the willingness and the financial ability to do for him graciously and gracefully, in the sacred secrecy of a love that loves after death, the last tender offer of placing his poor broken form in his only six feet of soil."

**Want the Earth?**

Since the announcement that the L. & N. Railroad Company had absorbed the Lexington and Eastern, the Council and Commercial Club of Lexington have determined to petition the absorbing company to recognize that city as a "real center" instead of a local station.

The line of the L. & N., leading from this city to Lexington has never been considered anything other than a branch but with the control of the L. & E., which extends into the mountain section of Kentucky, they demand to be made the center of operations of the road.

The extensive improvements made by the L. & N. in this city has evi-

dently hurt the pride of Lexington and as operations of the road are centered here it seems a little more than Lexington can bear to see a sister city get anything, no matter how small, when her railroad facilities are five times greater than those of Paris, or even Danville, which place has been made the base of activities of the Q. & C.

The fact that the jealousy of Lexington is cast upon Paris and Danville, is evidenced in the following which appeared in the Leader of that city Monday:

"It is a curious fact that although Lexington is the second city in Kentucky, and is blessed with five railway systems, it has been gradually losing ground as a terminal or division headquarters, and is but little more than a way station on several of the more important lines. The Queen & Crescent system has never maintained any shops here and has now practically abandoned all pretense of office here, having made Danville the seat of its activities in Central Kentucky, and the Louisville & Nashville system has for years centered its operating activities for this section in Paris, and made Lexington a branch line station. Now that the Louisville & Nashville rail way has become all powerful in the development of the unopened mountain section of Kentucky that is immediately tributary to Lexington and has acquired such a splendid line as the Lexington & Eastern with important terminals already established in Lexington, this city may hope to come into its own as a railway operating center rather than as a local station."
