S. G. Clay Out for Representative.

Hon Sidney G. Clay Friday made formal announcement of his candidacy for re-election as Representative from Bourbon county in the Lower House of the Kentucky Legislature.

At the last session of the Legislature Mr. Clay served with distinction and was a member of six committees of the House, being chairman of the Committee on Fish and Game and a member of the Committee on Agriculture, Revenue and Taxation, Racing, Classification of Cities and Towns and Cities of the Fourth Class.

Being one of Bourbon's most prominent farmers stands for legislation to the best interests of the agriculturists and if elected to succeed himself will in all probability be selected as chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture.

No other candidate has so far been mentioned to oppose Mr. Clay for the nomination which will be voted on at the Democratic primary July 1.

Farm Conditions in Bourbon.

Farmers are well up with their work and are waiting for seasonable weather conditions.

The cold weather has retarded growth and vegetation is yet dormant. The apprehension felt for the safety of the fruit crop has somewhat subsided, as late investigations show that most fruit buds are safe.

Early peaches were nipped and some plums and pears were frosted.

The strawberry crop and all other small fruits are safe and the apple crop, except early June varieties, are unharmed.

The oats crop has been seeded and with a warm rain will burst forth from the ground for an early start.

Grass is being held in check by cold dry weather of the past two weeks which augurs well for a bountiful seed crop, which was cut short last year by the freeze of April 24.

Live stock is doing well and fat hogs are being shipped in liberal numbers to the Eastern and Cincinnati markets.

The Republican State Central Committee, at its meeting Saturday in Louisville decided upon a delegate convention for the nomination of a State ticket to be held in Louisville, Tuesday, July 11. Delegates to the State convention from the various counties will be selected at county mass conventions on Saturday, July 8.

Since the Clymer squad arrived in Paris last Wednesday afternoon, weather conditions have been such as to keep them indoors and the depressing atmosphere of the hotel lobby overcame the squad leader and it was decided to take the first train back to the Fulton capital.

Idleness had put the men back in the same condition practically as they were when they first reported for practice. Clymer is very much dissatisfied with the trip of this portion of the club to Kentucky.

"We have not had a decent day since we left Hickman," said Clymer, "and the boys have become dissatisfied with lying around the hotels and waiting and hoping for bright sunny weather for practice. Nothing is more harmful to a ball player at this season of the year, and maybe there will be something better in store for us when we reach Hickman. The boys are all out of sorts and it is our hope to get them in shape before we start on the trip north."

The Minneapolis club will leave Hickman next Friday night for Evansville, Ind. where they will play off a schedule with the Central League Club of that city, after which they will be joined by the Southern squad which will be in Memphis at the same time and together they will go to Toledo for their opening game on April 12.
