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Georgetown Easy for Paris Team

The Paris club defeated a team from Georgetown College Wednesday afternoon by a score of 12 to 8.

The game was slow from start to finish as the Georgetown aggregation was outclassed and the only runs made by them were allowed through errors on the part of the Bourbonites.

McKernan used three pitchers, Shears starting it off for Paris, being replaced by Schrauder in the sixth, who retired for Maxwell in the eighth. The Paris boys had no trouble connecting with Judd and seemed to be able to place them anywhere in the field they desired.

Mayer was the backstop for Paris and did splendid work throughout the game. He caught two men off first with ease and his pegging was of a high class. He also caught a man off third, assisted by Kuhlman. Outside of Parks' drive which landed against the back fence, there was nothing startling in the playing of the visitors. No scores were made until the fifth inning when three runs were chalked up to their credit. They succeeded in getting five runs in the eighth due entirely to the lax playing of the home team. Stone, a pitcher who hails from Pennsylvania, reported for duty Wednesday and looks to be good. He played last season with Williamstown, in the Tri-State League and made a fine record for himself during the season. Manager McKernan is on the lookout for a good outfielder and is now corresponding with several looking towards having them join the Paris team by the time the season opens, at least.

Tomorrow afternoon the Paris team will meet the State University team from Lexington.

Richmond is planning for a lively time when the season opens in that city on May 10. Richmond will open at Winchester on May 9, and on the following day the fans of Pioneer town will give a monster parade which will be headed by a brass band and participated in by all the "bugs."

Milt McCormick, last year with Paris and who was sold to the Albans, Ga., club of the South Atlantic League, shut out the Macon club Tuesday allowing his opponents but five hits. Jack Scheneberg, with Savannah, of the same league, lost to the Augusta Club in a game Monday.

Frank Goodman, of the pennant winning aggregation, rolled into camp Monday night, and got down to hard practice Tuesday morning. Goodman has been railroaded, all winter on a short line running out of Paintsville, and aside from a few slight touches of rheumatism says he has wintered well and is anxious for the season to open. He had not engaged in any practice prior to reporting but there is no doubt but that he will be in tip top shape for the opening game with the Wharf Rats.

The Cincinnati Enquirer has the following of the Paris club which will play the Wiedemanns in Cincinnati Sunday:

"The champion Paris team of the Blue Grass League will play the Wiedemanns Sunday at the Wiedemann park. President [Herman, of the Reds, has granted the Wiedemann management special permission to pull off the game. His consent first had to be obtained, according to the national agreement. Paris has always been a big attraction in this vicinity. This is the first time for four years that they have appeared in Northern Kentucky, and the fans will remember how they trimmed the Covingtons, with Red White pitching for Covington, when Manager Aptime for four years that they have appeared in of 14 straight games. Ed McKernan, the Paris manager, is a Cincinnati boy, and several of the players are from this section, among them being Mayer, who did the catching for the Cincinnati Shamrocks last season; Joe Rapp and Leslie Timme. "Mac" expects one of these lads to turn out to be great a find as Kaiser, who was with his team last year, and now playing with the Chicago National League champions."

A number of Paris fans have signified their intention of accompanying the Paris team to Cincinnati.
