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## For Commissioner of Agriculture.

Senator Wyatt is making the race for the Democratic nomination for Commissioner of Agriculture before the Democrats of the state in the primary July 1. He is a successful farmer and comes from one of the best farming sections of Western Kentucky.

His record in the State Senate has been highly creditable and particularly notable for his work in behalf of legislation for the farmer.

The Bosworth-Wyatt Good Road Amendment to the Constitution is a part of Kentucky's history. Senator Wyatt was chairman of the Good Road Congress held at Louisville last December and has been actively engaged in this work for several years; believing with all others that the farmers are the first to be benefited. He is also a stern advocate of educating the farmer along the lines of his occupation toward intensive and co-operative farming.

Since there has never been a Commissioner of Agriculture elected from Western Kentucky, which is notably the farming section of the State as well as strongly Democratic, it is fair that the nomination for this office be given to a Western Kentucky man. It

## County Board Meets.

The Bourbon County Board of Education met in the County Superintendent's office on June 5, 1911, with the following members present: D. C. Lisle, Wesley Florence, R. H. Burris, J. N. Mason, J. F. Ingles, F. F. Hurst and Miss Robbins.

The minutes of the two preceding meetings were read and approved. Mr. D. C. Lisle suggested the name of Alley Rowland as local trustee in Sub-district No. 2, Educational Division No. 1, Jacksonville, and on motion duly made, seconded and carried, Mr. Rowland was nominated, subject to the ratification of the Division Board.

On motion made, seconded and carried R. L. Tarr was appointed on the Committee with F. F. Hurst to take the place of J. T. Purdy.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Jacksonville Colored School Educational Division No. 1, Sub-district No. 2, be and is hereby consolidated with the Centerville school on account of having less than forty pupils, but that said Jacksonville school shall have a separate teacher, and that the school shall be conducted in the house used for that purpose in Sub-district No. 2.

It was moved by D. C. Lisle, seconded by J. F. Ingles and carried that J. N. Mason, J. W. Penner and the Superintendent be appointed a committee to dispose of the school building at Spears Mill, and to contract for the erection of a new and suitable building in compliance with the plans and specifications now in the office of the Superintendent, by which plans all the one room houses for schools in the county shall be constructed.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the salary schedule, providing that the maximum salary for the nine months' term be fifty dollars per month and the minimum salary thirty dollars per month, as presented by the Superintendent, be and is hereby adopted.

Accounts to the amount of \$279.72 were allowed whereupon the Board adjourned to meet again at call of Chairman.

## Bristow in the Race.

Judge Louis L. Bristow, of Georgetown, on Wednesday announced himself as Republican candidate for Secretary of State. He is at present acting as County Judge of the Scott County Court, under appointment of Governor Willson, to succeed the late Judge J. J. Yates.
