Sticks Knife Cleared Through Body

When R. T. Davis, of Mayfield, former sheriff, pioneer traveling salesman and primitive Baptist preacher, took a dose of poison and followed this with a stab in his side he struck with such force that the whole knife, blade, handle and all, passed through the wound and fell into the stomach cavity, where it was found at a post mortem examination. Bad health and business reverses are said to have been the cause of the suicide.

Making Preparations for Monster Barbecue.

Preparations are being fast made for the big Democratic barbecue to be given at Blue Lick Springs, Nicholas county, for which the Democrats of Nicholas, Fleming and other counties are working. Seventy-five lambs, several hives, 600 gallons of coffee and 600 gallons of Kentucky burgoon will be prepared besides other provisions for the great crowd that will attend. It is said that the meeting will be held September 14.

Valuable Birds.

An exchange says: "After the quail has been almost exterminated, the scientists tell us that each quail is worth its weight in gold to every farmer. From September 1 to April 1 each 'bob white' eats 260 pounds of weed seeds. From April to September it lives upon insects as well as seeds and industriously consumes the most active crop pests in this country, such as chinch bugs, cotton worm, wheat weevil, cucumber and barn beetle, potato bugs, cut worms and grasshoppers. One stomach, when examined, contained more than 100 grasshoppers. The wise farmer will protect the quail and give them the run of the farm."

Forty Million Pigs' Feet a Year.

Chicagoans eat annually about 40,000,000 pigs' feet. This was the estimate made by packers and retail meat dealers. Incidentally it was announced that the pigs' feet season is in progress. Within a few days retail meatdealers expect a big demand for the article, and are laying in big stocks.

Chicago is said to consume more pigs' feet annually than any other city in the country. The demand is largest in the foreign colonies, but a large number of Americans are also fond of the product.

The Germans and Scandinavians are said to be the largest consumers, many of these nationalities doing their own pickling and eating the meat at all times of the year.

Many Improvements in the State Asylums.

The State Board of Control of Charitable Institutions are making extensive improvements in the buildings at the asylums and the Feeble Minded Institute in Frankfort. They have advertised for bids for the erection of a kitchen, bakery and dining room at the Feeble Minded Institute which will cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000.

At the Hopkinsville asylum a sanitary barn is being erected which will cost about \$9,000 and will have a capacity for 100 cows. A dormitory costing \$40,000 for colored patients has just been completed at Lakeland and cottages for tuberculosis patients are nearing completion.

At Lakeland asylum a tuberculosis hospital costing about \$11,000 is under construction, and pipes are being laid from the reservoir at Louisville to the asylum, at a cost of \$85,000.

The Eastern Kentucky Asylum at Lexington is also getting a number of improvements.

Dies of Grief Over Desertion.

In the fever of a delirium that had been upon her since the day of her desertion in a Cincinnati hotel as the bride of Peter Paul Apkins, now under arrest at Richmond, Ind., on a charge of bigamy, Elizabeth Young Apkins died Thursday afternoon at the home of her foster-mother, Mrs. J. M. Baxter, near Lexington.

Miss Young and Apkins were married in Lexington on Friday, May 26, by Rev. I. J. Spencer, of the Central Christian church, after a brief courtship. The following morning they took a train for Cincinnati, where they registered at a hotel.

At midnight people in the hotel were aroused by screams issuing from the room occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Apkins, where the bride was threatening to throw herself from a window. The bridegroom had deserted her.

She was transferred in a patrol wagon to a sanatorium. Sunday morning Apkins called Mrs. Baxter on the telephone and told her to come to Cincinnati, saying that his bride was very ill.

Mrs. Baxter and Mrs. Irene B. Strode, a cousin of Mrs. Apkins, hurried to Cincinnati. Apkins had disappeared, likewise a considerable sum of money and some jewelry belonging to the bride, the girl's relatives charge.

Mrs. Apkins was returned to her home in Lexington the following day, and from that time until the hour of her death she had few lucid moments. She was constantly in fear, believing that Apkins was near and was attempting to take her life.

Apkins was arrested at Richmond, Ind., July 20, on a charge of forgery. It developed from papers in his possession that he had previously married and deserted Mrs. Bertha Coler at Paris, Ill.

The Fayette grand jury last month returned an indictment charging Henry Baker, of the Lexington force, went to Indianapolis with requisition papers.
