Prospects for 1912.

Counting Arizona and New Mexico there will be 531 votes in the electoral college which will elect the president of the United States in 1912. According to the usual method of figuring, it is safe to count as surely Democratic the following states: Alabama 12, Arkansas 9, Florida 6, Georgia 14, Kentucky 13, Louisiana 10, Maryland 8, Mississippi 10, Missouri 18, North Carolina 12, Tennessee 12, Texas 20, Virginia 12. Total, 175.

States that have strong Democratic leaning and may be reasonably depended on are Colorado 6, Arizona 3, New Mexico 3. Total 12. This gives a total Democratic strength of 187, leaving 79 to be obtained from the doubtful states.

Leaving out all other states that went Democratic in 1910 we find three states which will give the Democratic candidates the necessary votes. They are New York 45, Ohio 24, Indiana 15. Total 84. Grand total 271. Under the new apportionment it will require 266 electoral votes to elect, so these figures show a safe majority.

Inauguration Plans Completed.

Plans for the inauguration of Governor McCreary were perfected at a meeting Tuesday of the Executive Committee in charge of the inauguration with Gov. McCreary at the home of the latter in Richmond. The program for the actual inauguration exercises was decided upon and the committees will work out the small details later.

The inaugural will be held in front of the Capitol. S. French Hoge, chairman of the committee, will introduce the Rev. J. R. Ziegler, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Frankfort, who will pronounce the invocation. Mayor James H. Polsgrove, of Frankfort, then will be introduced, and he will introduce Gov. Willson, who will deliver his valedictory. This will be followed by the swearing in of the new Governor. The oath will be administered by Chief Justice Hobson. Governor McCreary then will deliver his inaugural address. Lieutenant Governor E. C. McDermott will then be sworn in.

After the address of Governor McCreary a public reception will be held in the Capitol for two hours. At the Capitol Hotel during the evening, the new Governor, his official family, the retiring Governor and his official family, with their wives, will receive in the parlors. The public will be welcomed. The inaugural ball will be held in the dining room of the Capitol Hotel. It will begin at 10:30 o'clock. Plans for the inaugural parade have not been worked out yet, but it is expected to be the largest that Frankfort has ever seen. One of the features of the inauguration will be a dinner given to the new Governor by Mayor Polsgrove.

Ginseng.

The light yellow root of ginseng is highly esteemed by the Chinese as a stimulant. It is used, however, for almost every domestic and medicinal purpose, and specimens resembling the human body often command their weight in gold because of supposed occult virtues. China furnishes almost the sole market for ginseng.

May Appeal to Congress.

Independent tobacco interests will appeal to Congress if necessary to have the Court's decree of dissolution of the tobacco trust reviewed by the Supreme Court. This was asserted by Felix H. Levy, their attorney, who appeared before the Interstate Commerce Committee of the Senate in Washington to give his views on the trust question.

The independents refused an opportunity to intervene in the dissolution proceedings, are moving in the court for a review of the case. Should this fail there they will endeavor to have Congress direct the Attorney General to have the decree brought before the Supreme Court.

"The plan proposed by the tobacco combination and approved by the Attorney General and the Circuit Court at New York is a sham and a subterfuge, knowingly devised by the tobacco company to seem to carry out the mandate of the Supreme Court, but which really leaves its monopoly unimpaired."

This was the sweeping statement of Felix H. Levy, attorney for independent tobacco firms and former assistant of the United States Attorney General, made before the Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce today. Mr. Levy was associated with Attorney General Moody in the preparation of the case against the tobacco trust.

"The Government," he said, "has sacrificed practically all of the benefit that were to accrue to the people of the United States."

STOCK, CROP AND FARM NOTES

—GEORGETOWN COURT.—The News reports Georgetown Court as follows: Auctioneer B. B. Peak reports 170 cattle on sale here yesterday. The market was fairly active. Among the sales made we note the following: For Stone & Palmer, 20 head of 11,000 pound feeders to Jas. Edwards of Versailles, at \$4.85 per hundred. For J. W. Thomason, eighteen head of good 860 pound yearlings to J. C. Noel of Franklin county at \$4.85 per hundred. Several bunches of common to good yearlings sold from \$3.50 to \$4.50 per hundred. Stock heifers brought from \$3.25 to \$3.75; calves from \$15 to \$21 per head. Sixteen head of dry cows brought \$3.35 per hundred. For J. W. Thomason 66 head of stock ewes at \$5.75 per head.

—The exact status of Kentucky's chances to have the quarantine raised on its sheep was explained by an official in the Bureau of Animal Industry in a bulletin issued from Washington which is as follows:

"Federal Inspector A. J. Payne, has written us that he hopes to be able to recommend the raising of the quarantine in certain districts of Kentucky early in the next year," said the official. "He is now making another inspection, and when he has finished that he will make his final recommendations to the department, which will then act upon it. He hopes to make this recommendation before the next shipping season."

"The department has noted with much satisfaction the efforts of the Kentucky Livestock Sanitary Board to pass remedial laws in the Legislature."

—It is announced that the sales of the 1909 crop of pooled tobacco, which were suspended last spring, will be resumed in Lexington Tuesday, November 28.

Contracts have been let for the remodeling of the society's warehouses at Georgetown and Cynthiana, where loose leaf sales are to begin about December 1.

The aggregate sales of 1911 loose leaf tobacco in five warehouses was \$8,645 pounds at an average of about seven cents. The top of the market was 19 cents for some particularly choice color tobacco. Tobacco with color have been scarce in the offerings and it may be that it will develop that there is an insufficient amount for all purposes in the new crop.

Judge John D. Carroll Named.

With sixteen out of nineteen members present the Fifth Appellate District Democratic Committee met in Lexington Tuesday at noon, and resolving itself into a convention, unanimously nominated Judge John D. Carroll, of Henry county, to succeed himself as Judge of the Court of Appeals from that district, to be voted for at the regular November election in 1912. Judge Carroll was the only candidate announced for the nomination, and in accordance with a resolution adopted by the committee at a meeting two months ago, its only duty at the meeting Tuesday was to formally declare him the nominee.
