\$5,000 Verdict Against L. & N.

Dixie McKinley, administrator of the estate of the late Sylvester Whalen, who instituted suit against the Louisville & Nashville railroad in the Harrison Circuit Court for \$25,000 damages for the death of Whalen received a verdict in the sum of \$5,000 in Cynthiana Wednesday. Whalen was killed while in the discharge of his duties as yard sweeper in the Louisville & Nashville yards in this city, the accident which caused his death occurring in front of the L. & N. passenger depot on the afternoon of July 23, when an engine backed down upon him, knocking him down and badly mangling his form, death resulting instantly.

Lively Scene at L. & N. Depot.

The surroundings of the Louisville & Nashville depot presented an animated scene Wednesday evening during the arrival and departure of the late trains. The walks in front of the depot were thronged with people waiting for their trains, a large number going from here to distant points to spend Thanksgiving, while numbers who changed cars at this point were awaiting the arrival of their trains. The scene presented on this occasion would leave the impression that Paris was a metropolis and gives a fair idea of the amount of passenger traffic that passes over the L. & N. daily, but more in evidence on this occasion which is due to the holiday season.

DEATH.

—Mr. William Lawrence, 65 years old died Wednesday morning at his home on Hanson street after an illness of about three weeks. The funeral will be held this morning at ten o'clock, the services being conducted by Elder Carey E. Morgan. Burial at Mt. Carmel cemetery in Nicholas county.

—Mrs. Moses C. Chaplin died at her home on Walnut Hills, Cincinnati yesterday, announcement of which was received by relatives in this city yesterday afternoon.

Mrs. Chaplin was formerly of this city and was a sister of Mrs. H. C. Howard, Sr., and Mrs. F. R. Armstrong.

The remains will be brought to this city for interment on Sunday, December 3 at 2 o'clock p. m.

—Miss Addie Fogg, aged 38 years, died yesterday morning at an early hour in her apartments in the Dow flats on East Main street from tuberculosis.

Miss Fogg has been in declining health for about a year. She resided with her brother, Mr. Clarence Fogg, who survives.

The deceased is a niece of Mr. S. W. Summers, of Paris and moved to this city from Mt. Sterling last May. The remains will be taken to Mt. Sterling Sunday morning on the 9:50 L. & N. train and the funeral will be held Sunday afternoon from the Christian church in that city.
