

### Western Union vs. L. & N.

The Western Union Telegraph Company filed suit in Louisville Thursday against the Louisville and Nashville railroad to condemn a right of way of its own over the right of way of the railroad on all of its lines in the State of Kentucky.

A contract which had been in force between the Louisville and Nashville and the Western Union for the past twenty-seven years was terminated last August, when the telegraph company served notice on the railroad company that it would a year hence, or on August 17, 1912, institute proceedings to build its own lines on the defendant's right of way, regardless of the mutual agreement which had existed in the past.

The petition of the Telegraph Company states that it has failed to reach an agreement with the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company regarding what shall be proper compensation for an exclusive right of way along the tracks of the defendant's road, and that it now stands ready to pay the company such just and reasonable compensation as may be decreed by the court.

The telegraph company asks that an order be entered condemning the use of so much of the right of way of the railroad company as is now occupied by the plaintiff with its wires and poles and so much of it as may be necessary for the construction, maintenance and operation of the telegraph lines along the tracks of the railroad company in Kentucky.

The right of way which is sought to be gained by the Western Union Telegraph Company embraces 1,574 miles of pole lines. It is stated expressly that the telegraph company does not seek to become an owner, in fee in any of the land condemned, but merely wishes an easement over the railroad's right of way without the obligation of a mutual contract, as has previously existed.

### Thinks Blue Grass Would Prosper.

Fred Turleyville, in the Indianapolis Sun, has the following to say of the Blue Grass League:

"The Blue Grass League centers about Louisville and Cincinnati, and of clubs are placed in Louisville, Newport and Covington it will give a big boost to the famous little circuit from the bluegrass fields. Grayson, of Louisville, is looking for a good farm right in the city, and also a money making one at the same time.

"It doesn't take very many hundred to support Blue Grass ball, and even if the attendance is small compared to the A. A. ball, it may be a relief to go out in Louisville and see a real 'wigner' when the Colonels are away from home. The Minny league has played the hot air circuit every year on entering Minneapolis and St. Paul, but we haven't seen any results so far. The Blue Grass invasion looks best from this angle."

Every stamp sold should mean the arresting of at least one person's attention to the danger and the opportunity to meet it which the Red Cross crusade affords. It should not be interpreted as a personal token of esteem, but as a message of admonition and reminder that a vitally important work is under way, and that the help of everybody is required to carry it to success.
