PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE.

Timber Crop is of Slow Growth, but it Pays to Cultivate it.

In order to get a crop of potatoes we plant and cultivate; if we want the best orchard we spray and prune, but we let nature plant and care for the wood lot, and then we wonder why that woodlot does not pay.

The timber crop can be improved by care for the same reasons that other crops can be improved.

Although it takes longer to raise this crop than any other, it can be raised on land otherwise unprofitable or idle.

Such a crop will in the end yield a comfortable bank account, and the value of the wood lot to the farm is greater than the sale value of the crop in the convenience and the saving of money by having various wood products at hand, in protecting the build-

ings and fields from wind and in the beauty of the farm. The time is coming when thrifty young timber not yet large enough to cut will have a good sale value.

The care of this crop causes little expense, and the wood lot offers one means of solving the problem of how to keep good farm help profitably employed all the year.

The three principal aims in caring for the wood lot should be to keep the ground thoroughly covered with trees, to have only the best possible trees and to make them grow rapidly.

In order to make timber grow fast care should be taken in choosing the kinds of trees to raise, the soil should be kept moist and mellow by protecting the leaf mulch, and the best trees should be given a fair amount of light by making improvement cuttings.

Methods of starting new trees either to fill openings now in the woods or to replace timber to be harvested are as follows: By sprouts, by seed falling from neighboring trees, by sowing seed broadcast and by planting trees or seed.—Cornell (N. Y.) Reading Course Lesson For Farm.

Cement in Tree Cavities.

If your orchard trees have decayed portions in them clean out the rotted wood, then bore diagonally into the wood in different directions from the bottom of the hole in order that the filling may hold. Fill the cavity with the following cement compound: Portland cement, one pound; sand, two pounds; cinders, two pounds. Pack the cement in well and seal all around the filling with a tar mixture. Leave no projections beyond the plane of the bark and immediately the wood ring and the bark will begin to form over the patch, and the tree will ultimately be as good as new. The entire heart of the tree may be cleared out and filled in this way and the tree will continue to flourish.—Farm Progress.

M., where a large gas producer electric plant, located within the city limits, is furnishing power to farmers round the city. One tract of 12,000 acres in the district is watered entirely by electric pumps.—Country Gentleman.

Sorghum on the Dairy Farm.

Sorghum has proved a very profitable crop in many of the most improved farms. It is especially good for dairy cows and hogs. One man who sells from 300 to 400 market hogs every year says that he carried his brood sows through the past winter on sorghum hay with the best of results.—Kimball's Dairy Farmer.

Beginnings of Lifeboat.

Like many other inventions, the lifeboat was a long time in finding favor. The first lifeboat was designed by a London coach builder, Lionel Lukin, in 1785, under the encouragement of the prince of Wales, but despite royal patronage, his invention received little attention, though one of his boats saved several lives at Bamborough. The loss of the Adventure in 1780 first destroyed public apathy in this subject and, with the offering of prizes for lifeboat designs a first step toward life saving at sea was taken.

CURIOUS BITS OF HISTORY

A HUNGARIAN HERO.

Hungary boasts of several national heroes, but none of them has a finer record for bravery than Miklos Zrinyi. He fought many a battle in behalf of his country, but the supreme hour of his life came at the close. On August 5, 1566, with 3,000 gallant followers, he took refuge in the little fortress of Sziget, and defended it against a great Turkish host, led by Suleiman, the Magnificent in person. For four weeks the siege went on, the Turks furiously assaulting the little fortress again and again. Finally, on September 7, the little Hungarian band, or what was left of it, led by Zrinyi, rushed out upon the Turkish host, determined to cut their way through or die in the attempt. They died, every man of them, Zrinyi the first of all. But it was an expensive victory to the Turks, for it cost them twenty thousand lives.
