The city council in regular meeting Wednesday night transacted a little business. All members were present except Councilman Jones. The most remarkable feature of the meeting was there were no accounts on the clerk's desks. Mayor Wadell reported the probable cost of running a third electric light wire which would be more than three hundred dollars. On motion of Councilman Miller the light committee was empowered to ascertain the exact cost and have the wire put in at their earliest convenience if in their opinion the cost was not excessive. Councilman Miller then introduced a motion to allow the cemetery Company \$75 on the construction of the concrete walk recently built from the gate to the cemetery, which is in the city limits. This measure was called up from last meeting and was the only feature of the evening that called for any discussion and was discussed by Councilman Miller, Peed, Butler, W. A. and Mayor Wadell. Councilman Peed offered a substitute that the company be allowed \$50 which was seconded by Councilman Ingels, Councilman Miller withdrew the original motion and the substitute carried after which the Council adjourned.

**McClintock Upheld.**

The special committee appointed at the Seventh Congressional District Progressive Committee meeting held in Lexington last Saturday, for the purpose of investigating the claim of J. D. McClintock to the chairmanship of the Bourbon County Progressive Committee came to Paris yesterday to investigate the alleged irregularities in securing control of the county committee.

The committee of investigation, composed of Chairman Prentice O'Rear, of Frankfort; County Chairman N. S. Offutt, of Scott, and County Chairman A. D. Arnett, of Woodford, met at the court house yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock to conduct the investigation at which the opponents to Chairman McClintock said they would produce sufficient evidence to have him ousted from the County Chairmanship.

After calling in consultation a number of the representatives of the party in Bourbon, members of the county committee, the action was upheld and the election of Mr. McClintock was ratified.
