

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

RESENT TAX IN GERMANY

Complaint by Foreigners on New Insurance Levy—Workers Especially Feel Burden.

Berlin.—Foreigners employed in Berlin and other German cities whose salary or income is \$100 a month or less are complaining bitterly over the new government insurance law which went in effect the first of the year.

This new law suspends all private sick insurance, which is replaced with a government insurance system. It is compulsory on foreigners residing in the empire as well as on Germans.

So far as foreigners are concerned, it affects principally teachers, government offices, etc. The annual cost varies from \$5 a year for those whose salary does not exceed \$125 a year to \$78 annual premium for those whose salary is between \$80 and \$100 a month.

The law provides that half of the cost of insurance must be paid by the employer and half by the insured. As a salary of \$100 a month also calls for an annual income tax of \$70, such an employee is compelled to pay \$9 a month for tax and insurance.

Should the insured leave Germany permanently during the first ten years he has no claim for the return of premiums paid and loses his rights to benefits under the act. As the majority of foreigners remain only two or three years, coming largely for the purpose of studying, few will have claims on the premiums paid.

Only such persons as were insured in foreign insurance companies doing business in Germany are exempted from the provisions of the law. There is but one American company doing business in Germany.

TO RAZE FORTS OF PARIS

21 Miles of Wall Around City, and Adjacent Huts, to Be Replaced by Playgrounds.

Paris.—The formidable problem of finding accommodation for 120,000 people who are to be evicted from their dwellings owing to the sale of the antiquated fortifications of Paris to city authorities by the French government is now before the municipal council for solution.

The space occupied by the 21-mile wall encircling Paris, and the "firing zone" 500 yards in width, facing it, is to be converted into public parks. This space is now covered by many thousand ramshackle houses, occupied by work people and ragpickers, and in many instances turned into resorts for criminals and tramps.

The proprietors pay a small annual sum for the privilege of being allowed to construct these huts on the condition that they are subject to destruction in case of war. There is not sufficient accommodation for the occupants in other parts of the city.

The amount of money expended in these old fortifications, erected in 1840, and now to be razed, exceeded \$200,000,000. It is impossible to enter the city without passing through one of the 70 gates, now used as tax collection stations.

OBJECTS TO BISHOP SMOKING

English Vicar Makes Protest in Press Against Aged Superior's Habit.

London.—Should a bishop smoke? Is the question raised by the discovery that Dr. Carr Glyn, bishop of Peterborough, indulges in the pipe. The discovery so disgusted the vicar of Brigstock, one of his clergy, that the latter has written to the press making public protest against the bishop's fondness for the pipe. The vicar says that he recently took his lordship to task about his smoking. It appears that the bishop recently took tea with some parishioners and the vicar felt himself called upon to give his lordship "some wholesome advice against the pernicious habit" of tea drinking whereupon the bishop by way of reply calmly produced a tobacco pouch and pipe and started smoking in the presence of his horrified rebuker.

The vicar after describing in his letter the mischievous effects of tobacco, expresses the opinion that no smoker is fit to administer to any congregation. The bishop, who is now in his seventieth year, and was formerly honorary chaplain to Queen Victoria, so far has not troubled to reply to this letter, but continues to enjoy his pipe.

WOLVES WIN ALASKAN DERBY

Race of Sixty-Five Miles From Nome to Solomon and Return Results in Close Finish.

Nome, Alaska.—The Solomon Derby for dog teams from Nome to Solomon and return, 65 miles over the snow trail, was won by John Johnson, driving a team of Siberian wolves, in 6 hours, 1 1/2 minutes. Oliver Blatchford, driving a team of Missouri bird hounds, was second; Alexander Holmson, driving a mixed team of Malamutes and Mackenzie river huskies, finished third, and Scotty Allan's team was fourth.

Only the four teams started and the gaps between them at the finish was not wide. All the dogs were in good condition at the end. The temperature was 30 degrees below zero, and as there was no wind, conditions were ideal for dog team racing.

Johnson led at the turn, which he reached in 2 hours 55 minutes.

The winning dogs formerly were owned by Lord Fox Ramsay. They hold the record for the all-Alaska sweepstakes race.
